*Bay of Bengal—Orissa Coast—Burabalang River—
Elfin Transit Marks erected.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 172, dated September 4, 1897, issued by this office, the Port Officer, Chandbally, has given further notice that Elfin transit marks are now erected on the north bank, entrance to the Burabalang river. Vessels entering to keep transit marks on. N.W. magnetic.

*Australia—Wide Bay Bar—Instructions for Crossing
and Entering.*

The Port Master, Brisbane, has given notice (No. 15 of 1898) that vessels crossing Wide Bay Bar must now keep the square beacons open twice their own width to the northward, and continue with them in that position until Inskip Point lead is crossed and the triangular beacons at that point are open twice their own width to the westward, then gradually bring them into line as the red buoy is approached. By following these directions a depth of 18 ft. at low water springs will be obtained.

The western corner of the outer bank is now working to the northward, and great care should be exercised whilst entering, especially during bad weather, when the break on the spit can be plainly seen.

The square beacons will be shifted as soon as practicable.
