China-Peiho River-Taku Lightvessel-Alteration in Position.

China-Hainan Strait-Extension of a Bank Westward of Cape Kami.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 442 of 1898) that the bank with 4 fathoms on it, lying about 17½ miles west of Cape Kami, extends further to the southward than shown on the chart, the French ironclad Vauban, drawing 27 ft., having touched the ground in a position from which Lamko hill bore S. 10° E., distant 18 miles, and Mt. Pingmar S. 37° W.

Shoal water appeared to extend still further to the southward. Approximate position: lat. 20° 13′ 30″ N., long. 109° 34′ 40″ E.

Arabia, North-East Coast-Pérsian Gulf Entrance-Particulars of Mariner Shoal.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No: 454 of 1898) that information dated July 15, 1898, has been received from the officer in charge of the Marine Survey of India that the shoal reported by H.M.S. Mariner in 1890 has been examined.

Mariner shoal is a small patch of 5 fathoms, coarse sand and shells, with irregular soundings of 6 to 10 fathoms around; it is marked by discolouration of the water and strong tide rips, and lies with north point of Jezirat Tanb bearing S. 49° E., and north-west point of Nabiyu Tanb S. 29° W., distant 8 miles.

Approximate position,: lat. 26° 21′ 45″ N., long. 55° 13′ 20″ E.

New Zealand—Port Nicholson—Pancarrow Head Fog Signal established.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 87, dated . April 7, 1898, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 457 of 1898) that on and after July 11, 1898, the fog signal on Pencarrow head entrance to Port Nicholson, would be established.

The fog signal is explosive, and will, during thick or foggy weather give one report every liften minutes.

The fog signal house is 384 ft. S.W. from the lighthouse, and elevated 145 ft. above the sea.
