PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by section 8 of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette, to establish a police force in any place other than large towns, though such force be not maintained in the manner prescribed by the said Ordinance, and to declare that certain of the provisions of the said Ordinance shall come into operation at such place, specifying the limits thereof:

And whereas it is expedient to establish a police force at Ragama in the Alutkuru korale south, Western Province, under the provisions of the said 8th section of the said Ordinance, and to declare that certain of the provisions of the said Ordinance shall come into operation therein within the limits hereinafter specified.

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do by this Our Proclamation, as from and after the 16th day of January, 1902, establish a Police force at Ragama aforesaid under the provisions of section 8 aforesaid of the said Ordinance, and declare that the following sections of the said Ordinance, save where they or any of them shall have been by any subsequent Ordinance in anywise amended or in part repealed, shall, from and after the said 16th day of January, 1902, come into operation therein, within the limits specified in the schedule hereto, namely, sections 51, 53, 54, 55, 57, 58, 59, 61, 62, 63, 65, 67, 69, 70, 72, 73, 74, 78, 79, 80, 81, 82, 85, 86, 87, 90, 91, 94, 95, and 98.

SCHEDULE.

The area within the following boundaries:-

WHEREAS by Ordinance No. 6 of 1901, as amended by Ordinance No. 17 of 1901, relating to the possession and use of firearms, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, by Proclamation to be for that purpose published in the Government Gazette, to bring any municipality, division, district, or villages, under the operation of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient to bring the town of Anuradhapura and the following villages in the North-Central Province, viz., Mihintale, Madawachchiya, Nochchiyagama, Kekirawa, Maradan-kadawala, Madatugama, and Habarana under the operation of the said Ordinance:

Now therefore know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the powers in Us vested by the said Ordinance, do hereby as from and after the 16th day of January, 1902, bring the town of Anuradhapura and the villages aforesaid under the operation of the said Ordinance.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the 23rd day of October, 1901, and published in the Ceylon Government Gazette, No. 5,811 of October 25, 1901, a police force has been located in the District of Wattegama, in the Central Province, as required by section 17 of "The Police Ordinance,

1865," and whereas by section 22 of the said Ordinance it is amongst other things enacted that for the purpose of discontinuing the police force when introduced into any District under the said Ordinance, the same course shall be taken as is prescribed in the Ordinance for its introduction, and if the demand for its withdrawal be adopted by the proprietors of two-thirds of the acreage, the Government Agent shall forthwith notify to Government that the required majority is in favour of the withdrawal of the said police force from the said District:

Now know Ye that We, the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby withdraw from 15th January, 1902, the police force from the said District, which consisted of and comprised all lands and high roads included within the external boundaries of the estates specified in the schedule hereto.

T is hereby notified for general information that a system of sanitary passports has been established at Reunion for all persons of Asiatic or African origin arriving in that Colony from countries adjacent to the Indian Ocean and its tributary seas from the Far East, from the Malay Peninsula, and from Australia. All such persons (and their belongings) will be disinfected on arrival, and they will also be vaccinated, if necessary, and then be given a passport which they will be required to hand to the Mayor of the Commune in which they elect to take up their residence. They will have to go to this place in the quickest manner possible, and will be kept there under surveillance for 7, 12, or 15 days, as may be decided in each case.

WHEREAS by section 19 of "The Vehicles Ordinance, 1901," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make by-laws as may seem necessary or expedient for the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the powers in Us vested by the said Ordinance, do hereby publish the following by-laws fixing the rates and fares for passengers as well for time as distance to be paid for vehicles, and framing a table of distances for the purposes of fares to be charged by distances, for the following places, viz:—(1) Within the town of Nuwara Eliya. Bounded on the north-west: along the north-west boundary of title plans 73,338 and 73,339 at the Kodigaha Gap. North-east and North: along the north-east and northern boundaries of private property till it reaches Talagala-oya; up the right bank of that stream and western edge of the reservoir of the waterworks to the point where the stream enters the reservoir; from that point straight to the waterfall at the north-west corner of Lover's Leap estate. East and North-east: along the eastern boundary of the military reserve till it reaches the boundary of title plan 87,650; along the northern and eastern boundaries of title plan 87,650 and production of the eastern boundary of that title plan till it touches the edge of the Barrack Plain reservoir; along the north-east edge of reservo:r to the dam; along the top of the dam and its direction produced in a straight line until it reaches a point 66 ft. from the centre of the Moon Plains road and on the outer side of that road. East and South-east: from the point last mentioned along a line 66 ft. distant from and parallel

to the centre of the Moon Plains road on its outer side for a distance of 27 chains along this line as far as the patana, and then due south across the stream to the edge of the forest, thence south and east along the forest to the extreme south-east corner of the tongue of patana which comprises the new rifle range. From this corner in a direct south-westerly line to the north-east corner of title plan 78,049, then following the south-east boundary of title plan 78,049 to the main road from Nuwara Eliya to Badulla, across the road in a direct line to the south-east corner of the wire fence enclosing Baker's Farm private lands, then following the wire fence to include Baker's Farm as far as Baker's Farm triangulation station. South: from this point in a direct line to the Gregory lake dam; thence down the course of the Nanu-oya to Blackpool. South-west: from Blackpool straight to One Tree Hill triangulation station; thence along the top of ridge overlooking Nuwara Eliya to a point due west of Queen's Cottage; from that point straight to Kikiliamana triangulation station; thence straight to the north-west corner of title plan 73,338; and (2) along the following lines of high roads, viz., from Nuwara Eliya to Gampola, Craigie Lea to Hatton, Tillicoultry to Eilden Hall, Caledonia Gap to Railway Gorge, 4½ miles (or so much as lies within the limits of the Central Province) of the road from Nuwara Eliya to Badulla; and (3) from Nuwara Eliya to Kandapola, Hakgala, and Nanu-oya.

THE CEYLON MEDICAL COLLEGE.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

Preliminary Examination.

THE Preliminary Examination for Medical Students of either sex will begin on March 17, 1902. The last day for entry is March 1, 1902.

The following is an extract from the Examination Regulations:-

The Preliminary.—This examination is held once a year in the third week in March. Before admission to the preliminary the candidate must present to the Registrar not later than March 1 the following certificates:-

Certificate of having attained 16 years of age.

(2) Certificate from one of his teachers of being of good character.

The candidate must pay the examination fee of Rs. 15 into the account of the Principal, the Ceylon Medical College, at the Bank of Madras, Colombo, and a receipt must be obtained, and must be forwarded with the application. The candidate will then receive a ticket bearing a number, which will admit him to the examination.

Subjects of the Examination.

English Language, including Grammar and Composition.

2. Latin, including Grammar, translation from specified author (the author selected is Livy, Book XXII.) and translation of easy passages not taken from such author.

Results of the Examination.

In publishing the results the names of the candidates will be placed in two classes, first and second. Those in the first, in order of merit; and those in the second, alphabetically.

The highest candidate in the first class, provided he obtains a sufficient number of marks, shall be awarded Government scholarship entitling him to three years' free education at the Ceylon Medical College; the second shall receive a medal.
