PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir J. WEST RIDGEWAY, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of the Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS in the course of the war now being prosecuted by His Majesty's Forces in South Africa numbers of the enemy have been captured and made prisoners, and it has been deemed expedient for the better custody and safe-keeping of the said prisoners that certain of them should be sent to this Island to be there held and detained for such period as may hereafter be determined

And whereas a large number of the said prisoners have arrived in this Island and are now kept and confined in the Camp situated in the village Galkissa, in the Palle pattu of the Salpiti korale of the Western Province:

And whereas by reason of the presence and confinement in the said camp of so large a number of such prisoners there is cause to apprehend public danger, should an outbreak of the said prisoners occur, for the prompt and effective suppression of which the officers of police and peace officers and the tribunals of civil and criminal justice ordinarily in use in this Island will be insufficient and ineffective, and it is also otherwise expedient and necessary in the interests of the public peace that martial law should be proclaimed and administered within the limit of the said Camp as hereinafter defined:

Now We, the said Governor, by virtue of the powers in Us vested, do hereby proclaim and declare that, from this day forth and until We shall make further order in this behalf, martial law shall prevail and be administered to all persons within the said Camp, the limits whereof are hereby declared to be—

Lot A.—On the north by the barbed wire fence on the Military land along the road from the Mount Lavinia Hotel to the main road, east by the barbed wire fence through the land called Malwatta,

50 ft. east of the boundary of Military land, south by the barbed wire fence on Military land to the north of the road from the Station and Station Master's premises to the main road, west by the top of embankment on the east of the road from the Mount Lavinia Hotel to the Railway Station.

Lot B.—On the north by the barbed wire fence on Military land running in a line with the southern end of the railway platform to the foreshore, east by the line of flags on military land to the west of the railway line, south by the rifle range stop butt on Military land, west by the foreshore.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Twenty-seventh day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Two.

WEST RIDGEWAY.

WHEREAS by the 19th section of "The Forest Ordinance, 1885," as amended by the 6th section of Ordinance No. 1 of 1892, it is enacted that whenever the following events have occurred, namely:—

- (a) The period fixed under section 7 of the said "Forest Ordinance, 1885," for preferring claims has elapsed, and all claims (if any) made within such period have been disposed of by the Forest Settlement Officer; and
- (b) If such claims have been made, the periods fixed for appealing from the orders passed on such claims have elapsed, and all appeals (if any) presented within such period have been disposed of by the Supreme Court; and
- (c) All lands (if any) to be included in the proposed forest which may be acquired under section 13 of the last-mentioned Ordinance have become vested in the Crown—

the Governor shall, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, specify the limits of the forest which it is intended to reserve, and declare the same to be reserved from a date fixed by such Proclamation:

And whereas all things necessary for declaring the forest hereunder mentioned to be a reserved forest have been fulfilled, and all times hereinbefore recited have elapsed, and it is expedient to specify the limits of such forest:

Now know all Men that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation proclaim the forest, the limits of which are set forth in the schedule hereto subjoined, to be a reserved forest as from and after the First day of February, One thousand Nine hundred and Two.

And We do hereby further specify the limits of the said reserved forest to be those set forth in the said schedule.

Given at Nuwara Eliya, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Thirtieth day of January, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Two.

SCHEDULE.

A triangular piece of land, situated in the Trincomalee District, Eastern Province, called Kanthalai block, and bounded on the—

North.—(a) Trincomalee-Anuradhapura road from about the 5½ milepost to the point where it crosses the Eastern Province-North-Central Province boundary at about 24½ milepost, a distance of 19½ miles.

(b) Demarcation lines excising—

- (1) Ververi, near the 7th milepost.
- (2) Pankulam claim, between 16th and 17th mileposts.
- (3) Tampakkoddai, between 18th and 19th mileposts.
- (4) Nochikkulam, near the 20th milepost.

East.—Demarcation line running from about the 5½ milepost, Trincomalee-Anuradhapura road, in a more or less south-westerly, southerly, and south-easterly direction, until it comes out at the 4th milepost, Trincomalee-Kandy road.

South.—(a) Trincomalee-Kandy road from the 4th milepost to the point where it crosses the Eastern Province-North-Central Province boundary at about the 28½ milepost, a distance of about 24½ miles.

(b) Demarcation lines about the 13th milepost, excising Tamblegam resthouse.

West.—Eastern Province-North-Central Province boundary from about the 28½ milepost, Trincomalee-Kandy road, to about 24½ milepost on the Trincomalee-Anuradhapura road, a distance of about 21 miles.

NOTE.—From this block is excluded the area of the Kanthalai tank and Vendaruan tank up to the circle of forests surrounding them.

Rule 41.

The Superintendent shall submit to the Inspector-General of Prisons for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council the name of every prisoner after he has actually served seven, ten, fifteen, and twenty years, irrespective of age. The Medical Officer of the Prison shall report fully in each case the condition of the prisoner, mental and physical, and whether imprisonment appears to have had, or in his opinion may be likely to have, an injurious effect on this condition.

Preliminary Examination.

THE Preliminary Examination for Medical Students of either sex will begin on March 17, 1902. The last day for entry is March 1, 1902.

The following is an extract from the Examination Regulations:—

The Preliminary.—This examination is held once a year in the third week in March. Before admission to the preliminary the candidate must present to the Registrar not later than March 1 the following certificates:—

- (1) Certificate of having attained 16 years of age.
- (2) Certificate from one of his teachers of being of good character.

The candidate must pay the examination fee of Rs. 15 into the account of the Principal, the Ceylon Medical College, at the Bank of Madras, Colombo, and a receipt must be obtained, and must be forwarded with the application. The candidate will then receive a ticket bearing a number, which will admit him to the examination.

Subjects of the Examination.

1. English Language, including Grammar and Composition.
2. Latin, including Grammar, translation from specified author (the author selected is Livy, Book XXII.) and translation of easy passages not taken from such author.
3. Mathematics, comprising Arithmetic; Algebra as far as simple equations inclusive; Geometry, the subject matter of Euclid, Books I, II, and III., and easy deductions.
4. One of the following optional subjects: Greek, French, German, Italian, Sinhalese, Tamil. The question on optional subjects include Grammar, easy translation from and into English.

Scheme of the Examination.

First Day	...	{ 9-12 A.M. English Language. 2-4 P.M. English Essay.
Second Day	...	{ 9-12 A.M. Latin, prescribed book. Unseen translation. 2-4 P.M. Latin Grammar, English into Latin.
Third Day	...	{ 9-12 A.M. Arithmetic and Algebra. 2-4 P.M. Geometry.
Fourth Day	...	9-12 A.M. Optional subjects.

Results of the Examination.

In publishing the results the names of the candidates will be placed in two classes, first and second. Those in the first, in order of merit; and those in the second, alphabetically.

The Preliminary Examination Prizes.

The highest candidate in the first class, provided he obtains a sufficient number of marks, shall be awarded Government scholarship entitling him to three years' free education at the Ceylon Medical College; the second shall receive a medal.

Examination Papers.

Copies of previous examination papers may be obtained on application to the Registrar.

Examinations accepted in lieu of the Preliminary.

The following examinations are accepted in lieu of the Preliminary Examination, provided that they include all the above subjects, and that these subjects have all been passed at one and the same time. Schoolmasters and teachers are particularly warned that the optional subject must be a modern language, and that Logic, Science, &c. are not recognized in place of such language:—

- (1) The Matriculation Examination of any recognized University of Great Britain, of the University of Bombay.
- (2) The First Examination in Arts of the University of Calcutta, Madras.
- (3) The Entrance Examination of Punjab, Allahabad.
- (4) The Senior or Junior Local Examinations of the University of Oxford or of Cambridge.
- (5) The Examination of the College of Preceptors for a First Class Certificate.
- (6) The Matriculation Examination of some University of Australia, New Zealand, Cape of Good Hope, &c.
- (7) Some Examination of Foreign Universities in Europe.
- (8) The Examination for the Secondary Education Certificate of the Egyptian Government.
