PROCLAMATIONS BY THE GOVERNOR.

IN the Name of His Majesty EDWARD THE SEVENTH, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY ARTHUR BLAKE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

HENRY A. BLAKE.

WHEREAS by the Ordinance No. 17 of 1869, intituled "An Ordinance for the general regulation of Customs in the Island of Ceylon," it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor may by Proclamation appoint any place to be a haven, creek, port, or warehousing port in this Colony, and declare the limits thereof, and appoint proper places within the same to be legal quays for the lading and unlading of goods: And it is also further enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by any Proclamation to be by him issued and published in the *Government Gazette*, to allow ships or boats under fifteen tons burthen to import or export any goods from or to parts beyond the seas at such ports or places, and during such periods or times and in such manner as may be deemed expedient, upon any Pearl Fishery or other occasion appearing to require the same:

And whereas it is expedient to appoint the roadstead and town of Pukulam, in the Northern Province of this Island, to be a port for the lading and unlading of goods: And whereas on the occasion of the approaching Pearl Fishery it is deemed expedient to allow ships and boats under fifteen tons burthen to import or export goods from or to parts beyond seas at the said port:

Now therefore We, the said Governor, by virtue of the powers in Us vested as aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and appoint the roadstead and town of Pukulam aforesaid to be a port for the lading and unloading of goods from and after the Eleventh day of February: And We do hereby allow, from and after the said last-mentioned day, ships and boats under fifteen tons burthen to import or export any goods from or to parts beyond the seas at the said port, under and subject to the laws and regulations regarding the importation and exportation of goods at other ports in this Colony, and during the continuance of the Pearl Fishery aforesaid.

And whereas Marichchikaddi is a convenient place at which the District Courts of Mannar and Puttalam may respectively be held, and is also a convenient place at which the Courts of Requests of the divisions of Mannar and Puttalam may respectively be held:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do by this Our Proclamation appoint Marichchikaddi to be a place at which the District Courts of Mannar and Puttalam and the Courts of Requests of Mannar and Puttalam may respectively be holden for the purposes of the administration of justice as from and after the Eleventh day of February, 1905.

WHEREAS by section 25 of "The Irrigation and Paddy Cultivation Ordinance, 1889," it is enacted that all rules for the enforcement of ancient customs regarding the irrigation and cultivation of paddy lands within any district in the Island framed under the provisions of section 13 or 16 shall be transmitted by the Government Agent to the Governor for the approval or disallowance thereof by the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and that in case such rules shall be approved notice of such approval shall be given by Proclamation, and the said rules shall be published in the *Government Gazette* and in the district in such manner as to the Government Agent shall seem expedient :

And whereas by section 26 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that the Government Agent may, if to him it shall seem advisable, and shall, upon the requisition of a reasonable number of the proprietors of the district where any rules for the enforcement of ancient customs are in force, call a public meeting of the proprietors for the purpose of adding to, amending, or repealing such rules or any of them :

And whereas the Government Agent of the Northern Province has drawn up rules under the provisions of section 16 of the said Ordinance for the districts of (1) Jaffna, (2) Mannar, and (3) Mullaittivu in the Northern Province, and published the same by Proclamation dated 26th September, 1903 :

And whereas the Government Agent of the Northern Province has drawn up the rules set forth in the schedule hereto to be the rules relating to the encouragement and extension of paddy cultivation and the enforcement of ancient customs, the irrigation and cultivation of paddy lands, and maintenance of water rights in the said districts of (1) Jaffna, save and except Karaichchi division, (2) Mannar, and (3) Mullaittivu in the Northern Province, under the provisions of section 16 of the said Ordinance in lieu of the said rules of 26th September, 1903, and the same have been transmitted by the Government Agent of the Northern Province aforesaid to the Governor for approval or disallowance; and whereas the said rules have been approved by Us, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council :

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, in exercise of the powers in Us vested by the said section 25 of the above-named Ordinance, do by this Our Proclamation approve of the rules set out :

in the schedule hereto as irrigation rules for the District of Jaffna (excepting therefrom the Karaichchi division), Mannar, and Mullaitivu in the Northern Province, as from and after the 11th day of February, 1905.

Irrigation Rules.

1. For the purpose of effectively carrying out the following rules, each tract of paddy field (veli) in a village shall be separately enclosed by itself with the customary fence of stakes or thorns. In cases where a veli is not easily definable the majority of proprietors and headmen shall decide what extent of tract is to be called a veli for these purposes.

2. Inasmuch as there are natural water-springs in certain villages which are sources of irrigation to a considerable acreage of adjacent paddy lands, the said springs (subject to all rights and reservations of the Crown, from whose land they spring, and subject to the rights of others, if any, than agriculturists, who have enjoyed a share of the water from time immemorial) shall, for agricultural purposes, be hereafter considered to be the exclusive and joint property of all the proprietors of the fields irrigated by the springs; and no person (subject to the above exceptions) shall employ the water of a spring for any other purpose than the irrigation of the fields dependent on it.

3. Each proprietor shall contribute annually, either in money or labour, in the following proportion towards any work of construction, repair, restoration, improvement, or upkeep of the bund, embankment, channel, peli, or water-course connected with the springs outside the fields, which the Government Agent, after due inquiry, shall consider necessary, and order to be carried out, viz. :—

One day's labour, or its equivalent in money, paid in advance, at the rate of 50 cents for each bushel of land owned by him in the field, provided that such labour shall not exceed thirty days in the case of a proprietor owning less than seventy-five bushels, and not less than six days in any case; and in the case of a proprietor owning seventy-five bushels or more such labour shall not exceed fifty days. Provided that if in any year it shall not be found necessary to require from every proprietor the full amount of labour, the Government Agent shall decide what proportion of labour shall be contributed by each proprietor. A fair day's labour shall be considered to be nine hours a day—i.e., from 6 A.M. to 11 A.M. and from 1 P.M. to 5 P.M.

4. In addition to the ordinary labour of the year, as above provided for, whenever the Government Agent, Assistant Government Agent, or person acting under their orders shall find it necessary to call out the labour of a village to perform an urgent work of repair or of prevention of inevitable damage, uncommuted labour, either in person or by substitute, shall at once be furnished by every shareholder and cultivator, and continued daily until the completion of the work.

5. Notice shall be given by beat of tom-tom in the village, not less than twenty days beforehand, of the intention to call out the labour of a village, provided for by the 3rd clause, and of the proportion of labour required.

6. By the tenth day from the commencement of the notice by beat of tom-tom, proprietors intending to commute shall make their intention known, and shall pay in before the day fixed for the commencement of the work the full amount of commutation due by them; each proprietor, electing to work, shall attend the appointed place for work at the proper time, and shall carefully carry out the work assigned to him by the officer in charge of the work.

7. The construction or improvement of water-courses, pelies, and channels inside the fields shall be considered to belong to the description of work provided for in clause 3. The mere upkeep, however, of the water-courses, pelies, and channels inside the fields shall be maintained by the proprietors of the shares through which they lead, whether such shares be cultivated or not.

8. Each proprietor of paddy fields who has hitherto enjoyed a share of water from these springs shall be allowed water from them in proportion to his share; the furthest share of land from the springs shall be irrigated first, and thence in regular succession up to the share of land nearest the springs. The shares of water, which are in divisions of time, shall be calculated from the time the water begins to enter each share of land.

9. Before the commencement of the sowing season the proprietors of paddy fields of each veli shall decide what description of paddy is to be sown for that season; and any proprietor sowing any other description of paddy than that agreed on by the majority of the proprietors shall do so on his own responsibility and risk, and shall watch, fence, and perform all the duties hereafter mentioned until all the paddy in the field is reaped. But whereas in some fields it is not possible to sow the same description of paddy over

the whole extent in consequence of the varieties of soil and inequalities of surface, a majority of the proprietors shall decide on the different descriptions of paddy to be sown, and all the proprietors shall watch, keep up the fence, &c., until all the paddy has been reaped.

10. If the proprietor of any field in a veli does not intend to sow his field for the season, he shall give due notice of his intention to the adjacent shareholder or shareholders in presence of the irrigation headmen on or before the 1st of June; and the share of such absentee, in that case, may be cultivated free of rent for that season by the adjacent shareholders, all the duties of a cultivator being performed by the person or persons so cultivating for the season.

It must be understood that such duties do not include services required of the proprietor by clause 3.

In the event of the adjacent shareholder being unable or unwilling to cultivate the absentee's share, any other shareholder is at liberty to do so free of rent.

In the event of an absentee not being cultivated by the adjacent or any other shareholder, the proprietor himself shall perform all the duties required of a proprietor, whether he cultivates his share or not. The cases of proprietors unable to cultivate their shares from ill-health, or some unavoidable cause, shall be specially considered by the Government Agent, who, if he think fit to do so, may remit the commutation for services due for that year under clause 3.

11. Any proprietor, if unable to attend personally, may provide for the cultivation of his share by substitute or "varakkudi," in the performance of the duties required. No proprietor, however, shall employ any substitute or "varakkudi" who is in the service of another proprietor as "varakkudi" without the consent of such other proprietor.

12. Each proprietor shall erect a proper watch-hut on his share, and watch his cultivation, and continue to keep watch in his share for fourteen days after the whole of his crop has been reaped. Information of the fact that the whole of his crop has been reaped shall be given by him, without delay, to the irrigation headman.

13. Each proprietor, whose share lies on the outside, shall put up his usual share of fence of the fields in a veli. The fences shall be made sufficiently strong to keep out cattle; and all cultivators of the fields in a veli who are liable under these rules to be called on to put up fences or portions of fences, shall put up their respective fences or portions of fences on or before the date fixed for the purpose by the majority of them at a meeting held beforehand; and each proprietor shall see that his fence or portion of fence is kept in proper order throughout the cultivation of the season until the crop has been reaped.

14. Each proprietor who stacks his paddy in a threshing-floor by himself shall put up a strong stake fence round it, and shall watch the threshing-floor until he threshes his paddy; and proprietors of different shares who stack their paddy in a common threshing-floor shall jointly keep up in like manner a strong stake fence round it; and each of the proprietors shall watch the threshing-floor for seven days after he has threshed his paddy.

15. All buffaloes shall, during cultivation, have wooden bells attached to their necks, and all known fence-breakers or dangerous animals shall be yoked with others.

All buffaloes shall be driven to grazing grounds by day and folding grounds by night, at places fixed, after due inquiry, by the Government Agent, who shall also, after due inquiry, select and fix for each village or group of villages their own proper cattle grazing and folding grounds; and no cattle of other villages shall be driven to those grounds without a special license from the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent, whether they be cattle belonging to the natives of the district or cattle belonging to owners in other districts and pattus.

All black cattle, goats, and sheep shall be herded during the day and folded during the night outside the fields; and when in any village a place has been fixed on, after due inquiry, by the Government Agent or Assistant Government Agent, as the place in which black cattle, goats, and sheep shall be folded during the cultivation season, no proprietor shall fold his cattle, goats, or sheep in any place nearer than the one fixed on to the spring, field, or village.

Proprietors of buffaloes, black cattle, goats, and sheep shall not suffer their cattle, goats, or sheep to trespass on the cultivation of any neighbouring village, nor shall they fold their cattle or drive them to pasture near the cultivation of or within the limits of any neighbouring village.

And whereas it is the practice to pasture cattle from Jaffna and other places near the cultivated fields in the Mannar and Mullaitivu Districts and the mainland of the Jaffna District, all persons owning, possessing, and tending such cattle, whether they be villagers or not, shall obtain from the Government Agent authority to pasture their cattle in either district only under a license, indicating the name of the owner and the person in whose charge they are to be left, and the number and description and brand-marks of the cattle.

Such license shall be in force only for the period named in it.

All persons so licensed shall be subject to these rules, and liable to the same penalties as the cultivators for breach of them.

16. All adult male inhabitants of a village and all proprietors, whether male or female, of fields in the village shall keep the paths leading from their village to the neighbouring villages clear of obstruction, bushes, &c., to a width not less than six feet, half-way between their villages and the neighbouring villages, and shall keep free of jungle a space round the outermost fences of the inhabited portion of the village of a width proportionate to the number of inhabitants, viz., villages containing fifty inhabitants and five valavus, 200 yards; under fifty inhabitants and over twenty-five, 100 yards; containing twenty-five and under, 50 yards.

Any neglect to comply with the above rules or any act committed in breach of them will subject the offender to the penalties provided for by section 27 of the Ordinance No. 23 of 1889.

Rules referred to.

1. No person licensed to carry on the trade of a butcher in Nanu-oya shall slaughter cattle and sheep at any place other than the public slaughter-houses on Edinburgh estate referred to in the Proclamation dated 18th November, 1904, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 6,020.
2. The plot of land adjoining the Constable Arachchi's residence is hereby appointed as the spot in which the licensed butchers of Nanu-oya shall, as required by section 12, sub-section 1, of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1893, expose to public view all cattle intended for slaughter for a period of not less than 24 hours immediately preceding the time of slaughter.
3. No cattle or sheep shall be slaughtered at the said slaughter-house except on such days and between such hours as may be determined by the Assistant Government Agent, Nuwara Eliya, notice of which shall be posted at the said slaughter-house, nor until after they have been inspected and approved of by the District Medical Officer, Nanu-oya, as fit to be slaughtered for human food.
4. Cattle rejected as unfit for slaughter shall be immediately removed.
5. The said District Medical Officer may prohibit the slaughter of any animal notwithstanding that it has been approved as aforesaid, if it should before slaughter be found to be diseased or otherwise unfit to be slaughtered for human food.
6. If on any animal which has been approved as aforesaid being slaughtered the carcase shall appear diseased or unfit for human food, the said District Medical Officer shall cause the meat to be immediately destroyed or so disposed of as to prevent its being exposed for sale or used for human food.
7. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall not permit the slaughter of any cattle which have not been approved as aforesaid as fit to be slaughtered for human food, or the slaughter of which the said District Medical Officer has prohibited as provided by rule 5.
8. No person shall remove from the slaughter-house, except under the directions of the said District Medical Officer, any meat which the latter has declared to be unfit for human food.
9. The fee for slaughtering shall be seventy-five cents for each head of cattle, and twenty-five cents for each head of sheep.
10. The person in charge of the slaughter-house shall keep a register in the form annexed of all cattle brought to the slaughter-house.

MISCELLANEOUS DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended February 4, 1905, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 97. The birth-rate per 1,000 was 29·8,* as against 25·8 in the preceding week and 21·3 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 93. The death-rate per 1,000 was 28·6,* as against 32·2 in the previous week and 40·1 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles. 13 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 22 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 4 from different kinds of fever; and 10 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 93 total deaths, 24 were of infants under 1 year of age, being in the proportion of 350 to 1,000 registered births, as against 405 to 1,000 in the previous week and 529 to 1,000 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
