By His Excellency Sir HENRY ARTHUR BLAKE, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Ceylon, with the Dependencies thereof.

WHEREAS by section 3 of Ordinance No. 12 of 1894, intituled "An Ordinance to authorize the destruction of valueless Documents preserved in Courts of Justice," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in that behalf made, to bring any court of justice in the Island under the operation of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is expedient to bring the Court of Requests of Balapitiya under the operation of the said Ordinance:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this our Proclamation bring the Court of Requests of Balapitiya under the operation of the said Ordinance No. 12 of 1894 as from and after the First day of April, 1905.

WHEREAS by the 13th section of "The Police Ordinance, 1865," it is enacted that the Proclamation establishing a police force in any town shall also specify and define the limits of such town, and that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, from time to time as occasion may require by Proclamation to alter or vary such limits:

And whereas by the joint operation of a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor dated the First day of October, 1859, and of section 7 of the above recited Ordinance, a police force was established in the town of Kurunegala, and the limits of the said town of Kurunegala were defined by the said Proclamation:

And whereas by a subsequent Proclamation dated the 20th day of April, 1883, the limits of the said town of Kurunegala were varied as set forth in the schedule to the said Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient for the purposes of the said Ordinance further to vary the limits of the said town of Kurunegala:

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the powers in Us vested by the said section 13 of the said Ordinance, do hereby as from and after the date hereof further vary the limits of the said town of Kurunegala for the purposes of the said "The Police Ordinance, 1865," as defined in the said Proclamation of the 20th April, 1883, and in the schedule thereto, by substituting the limits set out in the schedule hereto for those set out in the said Proclamation of 20th April, 1883, and in the schedule thereto.

Given at Colombo, in the said Island of Ceylon, this Seventeenth day of March, in the year of our Lord One thousand Nine hundred and Five.

Schedule referred to.

COLOMBO WEEKLY HEALTH REPORT.

THE weekly return of births and deaths in the Colombo town for the week ended March 18, 1905, is subjoined (A).

Births.—The total births were 61. The birth-rate per 1.000 was 18.7,* as against 24.6 in the preceding week and 24.4 in the corresponding week of last year.

Deaths.—The total deaths were 105. The death-rate per 1,000 was 32·2,* as against 33·2 in the previous week and 30·1 in the corresponding week of last year.

Causes of death.—No persons died from cholera, smallpox, or measles; 13 died from diarrhoea and dysentery; 26 from phthisis, bronchitis, and pneumonia; 10 from different kinds of fever; and 10 from infantile convulsions.

Infantile deaths.—Of the 105 total deaths, 10 were of infants under 1 year of age, being in the proportion of 426 to 1,000 registered births, as against 375 to 1,000 in the previous week and 256 to 1,000 in the corresponding week of the previous year.
