Limits of Badulla.

North.—Ridipana gap.

South.—Kuda-oya anicut to the Bo-tree, from thence along the Hanwella, Kalugalpitiya, Etimola-ela to the Spring Valley cart road, thence along the same Etimola-ela to the tiled house occupied by Kiri Banda, and from that tiled house to the junction of Mayilagastenne Kuda-oya with Badulla-oya, and thence in a straight line to the 82nd milepost on the Badulla-Nuwara Eliya road.

The Northern limit.—The railway crossing near 1½ milepost on the Dimbula-Dikoya road.

On the West.—A line drawn from that point to Shand's bungalow, thence along the Dunbar estate road to the junction of that road with the Dikoya cart road near the Dunbar cattle galas, thence along the Dikoya cart road with width of 100 ft. from centre of road up to the southern boundary of the Dikoya estate.

A line beginning at a point on the Suduganga river, 200 ft. east of the north road near the Diyabubula bridge, and running 200 ft. east of and parallel to the north road till it meets the Brachmana-ela, thence along the ela eastwards to a point where it touches the boundary of the land belonging to the Ceylon Government Railway, thence northwards along the boundary of the said railway land to a point where it touches the Periaddewatta drain, thence along the drain to a point where it meets the Molundapitiya path, thence along the path to a point where it turns eastward, thence along the eastern boundary of the garden called Makulgahagedarawatta belonging to Kuna Runa Marikkar till it meets the southern boundary of the garden called Gedarawatta belonging to K. T. M. From this point a line running 200 ft. east of and parallel to the north road and Rattota road to a point $17\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Kandy, thence crossing the road parallel, and to the north of it 200 ft. from it to a point 200 ft. east of the north road, thence parallel to and 200 ft. to the east of the north road to a point $17\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Kandy, thence crossing the north road to a point 200 ft. west of it, thence southwards parallel to and west of the north road, King street, and the Esplanade road, and 200 ft. from them till it joins the Brachmana-ela, thence westwards along the Brachmana-ela to and including the Panagama bathing place, thence to a point 200 ft. west of the District Road Committee Office, thence southwards parallel to and west of the road past the Kachcheri, and 200 ft. from it to a point 200 ft. from the Hulangamuwa road, thence 200 ft. from and parallel to the Hulangamuwa road, and north and west of it to the Kumbiyangoda-oya, thence along the Kumbiyangoda-oya to a point 200 ft. south of the Nagolla road, thence south and east of the Nagolla road parallel to and 200 ft. from it to a point where it meets the northern boundary of lot 3,782 on preliminary plan 982, thence eastwards along the said northern boundary and the northern boundary of title plan 72,867, the southern boundaries of title plan 124,224, 124,227, 124,229 to the south eastern corner of the cemetery, thence in a line east, south-east till it reaches the Moysey Crescent road, thence across that road and along the eastern boundary of lot 5,936 on preliminary plan 1841 till it reaches the Suduganga river, thence along the Suduganga river to the point, whence the line started, excluding all the land which does not lie within 200 ft. of the circle formed by the Hulangamuwa, Nagolla, and Layard roads.

Now know Ye that We, the said Governor, do hereby proclaim the said rule.

IT is hereby notified that the rules made under the provisions of the Village Communities' Ordinances, No. 24 of 1889 and No. 9 of 1894, for the several divisions of Galboda and Kinigoda korales, Paranakuru korale, Beligal korale, and Three Korales and Lower Bulatgama of the District of Kegalla, in the Province of Sabaragamuwa, and published in *Government Gazette* No. 5,576, dated 21st October, 1898, are cancelled, and that the following rules as amended and revised by the several Village Committees of the aforesaid divisions under the provisions of the above Ordinances and approved by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, are published for general information.

RULES.

VILLAGE WORKS.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (1).

1. *Paths and Roads.*—The Village Committee shall decide what village paths and roads are to be constructed and maintained within its jurisdiction, and shall fix the breadth not exceeding 12 ft. to which each path or road is to be cut and the course it is to take.
2. *Encroachment on Roads.*—No person shall block up, obstruct, or interfere with, or encroach upon any village path or road either constructed or in course of construction.
3. *Injury to Village Property.*—No person shall destroy, damage, or deface on any way any village path, bridge, edanda, ambalama, or any village property whatsoever.
4. *Wells for drinking Water.*—The Village Committee may, after giving due notice thereof, set apart certain wells and spouts to be used for obtaining water for drinking purposes only, and no one shall bathe or wash clothes at a wells so set apart.
5. *Protection of Wells.*—The owners of land in which wells are situated shall surround such wells with a fence or wall to such height as may be ordered by the chief headman of the district.
6. *Ferries.*—The Village Committee shall prepare a list of village ferries constructed, regulated, or protected under this Ordinance, and may lease out the right to work such ferries. The hire for the conveyance of passengers, animals, and goods shall be in accordance with the following rates at such ferries:—

7. *Slaughtering Cattle.*—No licensed butcher shall slaughter cattle, goat, sheep, or swine, except in places assigned or approved of by the Village Committee.

SCHOOLS.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (2).

8. *Establishment of Schools.*—At the request (by petition to the Assistant Government Agent) of the parents or guardians of 25 or more children for the establishment of a school, or if the Committee report to the Assistant Government Agent that a site has been fixed upon for a school, and there is likely to be a good attendance, the Assistant Government Agent shall, if he thinks fit, make application to the Director of Public Instruction for a schoolmaster, and the necessary furniture free of charge to the villagers.

9. *Attendance.*—All parents or guardians who live four miles of a village school established under the Village Committee Ordinances, or of any village school to which the Village Committee shall extend this vote, shall send such of their children as are between the ages of (7) seven and (16) sixteen to such school at least four days in each week; or until they have passed the 5th standard.

10. *List of Children.*—It shall be the duty of the headman of any village included within the limits mentioned in rule 12 to prepare and forward annually on or before January 15 to the proper schoolmaster, through the Village Committee, a list of all children living in that village who are between seven and sixteen years of age, giving the names of their parents or guardians.

11. *Absentees and irregular Attendance.*—It shall be the duty of the schoolmaster to forward to the Committee the names of the parents or guardians of any children described in this list, who have been improperly absent from school or who have been unpunctual in attendance.

FISHERIES.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (3).

12. *Killing Fish by Poison.*—No person shall put poison or dynamite into water for the purpose of killing fish.

13. *Fishing in forbidden places.*—No person shall fish in public waters or places in which the Village Committee have forbidden fishing.

CATTLE.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION 6, ORDINANCE 1 OF 1898.

14. *Branding of Cattle.*—All cattle that have attained the age of 18 months shall be branded. On the left side with the korale number and the initial letter of the village. On the right side with the owner's initials. The korale numbers shall be as follows:—

For Paranakuru korale...	(1)
For Galboda and Kinigoda korales ...	(2)
For Three Korales and Lower Bulatgama	(3)
For Beligal korale ...	(4)

15. *Alteration of Brandmarks.*—No person shall alter or deface the brandmarks on any cattle, except with the permission of the Assistant Government Agent.

16. *Registering Cattle.*—Every cattle owner shall, on or before November 30 in each year, give a list (in Form A) of all cattle in his possession to the Arachchi of the Wasama in which he resides. From these lists the Arachchi shall prepare (in form B) a register of all the cattles in his wasama and forward it to the Village Committee before the close of the year.

17. *Sale and removal of Cattle.*—No cattle shall be sold or transferred, except on a voucher in the Form C, and no cattle shall be removed from one pattuwa or korale to, or through another without a permit in the Form D. Arachchies shall issue cattle vouchers and Koralas, issue permits for removal, and may charge a fee of cents 50 for each voucher and cents 25 for a permit so issued. In permits for removal for tending purposes it should be stated on what conditions the animal is given out to tend.

18. *Stray Cattle, &c.*—All cattle found straying on public paths or places may be seized by the village headman and brought before the Village Committee.

19. *Disposal of Cattle seized.*—Notice of such seizure shall be given to any known claimant of such animals. If not claimed within 10 days the animal shall be taken to the Village Tribunal to be dealt with, in terms of section 8 of the Ordinance No. 9 of 1876.

20. *Tying Cattle in Thoroughfares.*—No person shall tie his cattle so as to obstruct a public thoroughfare.

CATTLE DISEASE.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (6).

21. *Segregation of diseased Cattle.*—The owner or person in charge of any animal attached with any contagious or infectious disease shall segregate it, and give immediate notice to the headman of the village in which the animal may then be.

22. *Removal of affected animals to hospital sheds.*—The owner or person in charge of cattle, if directed so to do by the village headman, shall at once have an animal affected with any contagious disease removed to a well-ventilated hospital shed and leave it in charge of a person appointed by the headman to tend, feed, and treat it.

23. *Disinfectants.*—The headman shall forthwith apply to the Chairman of the Committee for a supply of disinfectants and medicines.

24. *Cattle in infected areas to be kept tethered.*—In every village in which cattle disease exists or has within 10 days previous existed, and in every village within a radius of three miles all cattle owners and persons in charge of cattle shall keep their animals tethered or securely pen them so that they cannot stray. No one, shall, however, tether any animal near a road or near any public place.

25. *Removal of animals from infected areas.*—No animals shall be brought into or removed from any villages mentioned in rule 24.

26. *Burial of Carcases.*—It shall be the duty of every owner or person in charge of deceased cattle to burn or bury at a depth of 6 ft., the carcase, dung, litter, &c., of any diseased animal, and also to disinfect the spot with disinfectants provided by the headman, and to thoroughly disinfect himself before he approaches healthy cattle.

27. *Disposes of carcases found unburied.*—Every person who, within an infected area, finds the carcases of any cattle lying dead and unburied, shall report the same to the nearest headman, who shall forthwith cause it to be buried in manner aforesaid.

28. *Disinterring carcases.*—No person shall disinter the carcase of any animal which died from infectious or contagious disease, or remove the flesh or hide or other parts of the carcase of such animal.

29. *Inoculation.*—Owners of cattle in an infected herd or village shall, subject to the advice of the Government Veterinary Surgeon, or on the orders of the Chairman of the Village Committee, have their cattle inoculated or subject to approved treatment at any spot selected by the Government Veterinary Surgeon or his subordinates.

30. *Segregation after recovery.*—Cattle that have recovered from an infectious or contagious disease shall not be allowed to mix with the healthy herd until fourteen days have elapsed after complete recovery.

BOUNDARIES.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (7).

31. *Boundaries of private lands.*—The boundaries of private lands shall be marked by fences, ditches, stones, or posts.

32. *Destruction of boundary marks.*—No person shall wilfully destroy or injure any boundary mark.

NUISANCES.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (8).

33. *Scavenging.*—The occupier of every house or land, or if unoccupied, the owner shall keep such premises clean.

34. *Disposal of Rubbish.*—No person shall put filth, rubbish, timber, mats or anything else on the road or into the road drains, nor keep carts thereon, except during the time of loading or unloading, nor allow children who are too young to take care of themselves to play thereon.

35. *Obscene Drawings and Writings.*—No person shall publish any obscene writing or make any obscene drawing likely to cause annoyance to others or to the public.

No person shall sing or recite in or near any public place any obscene song or ballad.

36. *Throwing stones and filth.*—No person shall throw stones or filth at another's house, or into another's compound.

37. *Committing Nuisance.*—No person shall go for any call of nature in any public place, where there are no public latrines provided, or by the side of any road or in any place visible to the public.

38. *Removal of overhanging trees, &c.*—The owners of any trees overhanging any public road or path shall cause such trees or the branches of such trees to be cut off when directed to do so by the Chairman of the Village Committee. In default the Arachchi shall cause the work to be done.

39. *Burial of dead Animals.*—No owner or tenant, not within an infected area, shall fail to bury the carcass of any dead animals which may be found on his premises.

40. *Unwholesome food stuff.*—No person shall expose for sale any articles of food which are unfit for human consumption.

41. *Prohibition of burial near dwelling-houses.*—No dead body shall be buried within 50 fathoms of a dwelling-house, or in any place where annoyance may be caused to persons living in the neighbourhood.

42. *Duty of burial by nearest relative.*—In the case of the death of any person the occupier of the premises where the death took place, or in his absence, the nearest adult male relative of the deceased shall be responsible for the proper burial of the corpse.

43. *Or by Village Headman.*—In the absence or default of such occupier or nearest relative the village headman shall cause such body to be buried.

44. *Defilement, &c., of wells.*—No person shall defile a well, cistern, or any public bathing place, or obstruct the supply of water from a well, spout, or any other water-course.

OBSCENE LANGUAGE.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (9).

45. *Obscene language.*—No person shall use obscene or abusive language calculated to provoke a breach of the peace.

SPRING GUNS, &c.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (11).

46. *Spring guns.*—No person shall set spring guns or make pit falls, except by permission of the village headman.

GAMBLING AND COCK-FIGHTING.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (12).

47. *Cock fighting.*—No person shall train cocks for fighting, nor go about with fighting cocks, nor take part in cock fighting in any place whatsoever.

48. *Instruments for gaming.*—No person shall have about his person or in his possession at any place to which the public have access with or without payment, any instrument or appliance for gaming.

49. *Presence at a gaming place.*—No person shall be present at a place where unlawful gaming is carried on.

50. *Raids on gambling dens.*—The chairman of the Village Committee or the President of the Village Tribunal, on receiving information that gambling is carried on in any place, shall issue a search warrant to any person he may deem fit to enter such place and search for, and seize any article used for any game of chance, and produce any such articles before the Village Committee or Village Tribunal.

VILLAGE LABOUR.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (17 a, b, c).

51. *Village Labour.*—All males, not being Europeans or Burghers, who are liable to perform labour under the Thoroughfares Ordinance shall be bound to perform three days labour in each year for the construction, maintenance, and improvement of works referred to in sub-sections 1, 2, 13, 16, and 17 of section 6 of Ordinance No. 24 of 1889.

Such labour may be commuted by a money payment of 50 cents before July 31 of each year, or by a payment of one rupee after such date.

52. *List of persons liable to Labour.*—A list of persons liable under rule 51 shall be prepared by the Arachchies of the different wasamas and sent to the Ratamahatmaya of the division before April 1 of each year.

53. *Notice to Labour.*—The Arachchies of the respective wasamas shall give eight days' notice to the persons who are liable to perform labour in their wasamas specifying date, time, and place. Any person so noticed to perform labour shall be compelled to work at any place within six miles of his residence. A list of persons who fail to work shall be prepared by the headmen who supervise the work and forwarded at once to the Korala of the division.

54. *Commutation of Labour.*—All persons who commute in lieu of labour shall pay 50 cents or Re. 1, as the case be, to the Arachchies, who will give them receipts bearing his signature. The moneys thus recovered shall be deposited in the Kachcheri to the credit of the Village Committee fund.

LOITERING.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (18).

55. *Loitering.*—No person shall loiter in a thoroughfare or public place after 9 o'clock at night without a light and without sufficient cause.

CULTIVATION.—SECTION 6, SUB-SECTION (21).

56. *Repairs of Lanes and Water-courses.*—At the cultivation season the Vel-vidane shall issue notice to the proprietors of paddy lands to begin the usual works for the repair of dams and water-courses, and for the construction of fences for the joint cultivation of their range of fields, and such proprietors shall, without unnecessary delay, proceed to perform the several works aforesaid.

57. *Distribution of Water.*—The Vel-vidane shall see to the just and equitable distribution of the water to the different fields, and no person shall furtively lead water into his field by cutting or piercing the dam above it.

58. *Cutting amunams.*—No person shall cut an amuna under any pretence whatever without the permission of the Village Committee.

59. *Limitary dams.*—Limitary dams separating the fields of different proprietors shall not be cleared, renewed, or repaired, except in the presence of the parties concerned, or except in the presence of the Vel-vidane after due notice to such parties.

60. *Fencing.*—The work of fencing a range of fields shall be carried on simultaneously on notice given by the Vel-vidane by the joint labour of all the proprietors to the extent each person holds or cultivates, and shall be completed within six days after notice as aforesaid has been given.

61. *Repair of Fences.*—Every fence shall be repaired and maintained in good order by the proper person and shall not be removed, except on the order of the Vel-vidane and except until the work of harvesting has been completed.

62. *Sowing.*—On a range of fields being fully prepared for sowing the Vel-vidane shall issue notice to the proprietors to sow, and each proprietor shall sow his portion within one week from the date of such notice, unless the weather or peculiar position of his field renders it impossible for him to sow within the prescribed time.

63. *Aqueducts.*—Aqueducts shall be cleared and maintained by joint labour of all the proprietors of the fields irrigated, in proportion to the extent of land owned by each.

64. *Driving in cattle after reaping.*—No owner of a paddy field situated in a range shall drive in cattle to his land after reaping, until all the fields in the range have been reaped and crops removed.

65. *Neglect of cultivation.*—If the cultivation of any field be neglected or abandoned by its owner, or unreasonably delayed after notice under rule 62 shall have been given by the Vel-vidane, the Village Committee may select any person to cultivate the field, and such person shall give the ground share to the owner.

66. *Construction of dams.*—All dams or other works required for preventing the overflow of streams shall be executed by the joint labour of all the proprietors interested in proportion to the extent of land held by each, after due notice by the Vel-vidane.

67. *Water for new asweddumas.*—No person shall divert water to asweddumize new land without the consent of the owners of the old fields.

68. *Threshing floors.*—Before the crops of a range of fields are about to be reaped the threshing floor of the range is to be put into proper order by the joint labour of the land owners concerned, after due notice from the Vel-vidane.

69. *Suwandiram.*—The Vel-vidane shall be entitled to suwandiram or commission of one per cent. on the produce of all paddy lands, except those sown with elwi within his subdivision. Such commission is to be paid at the threshing floors before any grain is removed.

70. *Power of Gan-arachchies.*—In villages where no Vel-vidane is appointed the Gan-arachchi shall have the powers and privileges of a Vel-vidane under rules 56 to 69.

CHAPTER XIII.

By-law 3 (d).

Every such person so employing a Municipal officer for the removal of night soil shall pay to the said Municipal Council in advance the sum of two rupees per mensem for each standard bucket in which such night soil is deposited on his premises for removal by such officer, provided that in the case of any house, building, land, or tenement assessed for Municipal rates at the annual value of less than Rs. 400 the sum payable per standard bucket shall be one rupee only per mensem.

SIR,—With reference to my circular despatch of the 28th of December last, relative to the importation into Great Britain of dogs brought from abroad, I have the honour to transmit to you, for the information of your Government, a copy of a letter from the Board of Agriculture enclosing a copy of a further notice which has been issued to the Press in this country on the subject, and calling attention to the desirability of giving wide publicity in the Colonies to their Order of the 12th of December, 1901, and Memorandum A 214/a, further copies of which are herewith transmitted.

SIR,—I am directed by the Board of Agriculture to advert to Mr. Graham's letter of the 31st December last acquainting the Board, in reply to their communication of the 12th December, that copies of the Importation of Dogs Order of 1901 and of the Memorandum thereon would be forwarded, as on previous occasions, to the various representatives of the Colonies in this Country and abroad, and I am to say that notwithstanding the wide publicity which has already been given to the requirements of the Order, the Board have issued to the Press a further notice, copies of which are enclosed, as a reminder to the public that the 15th instant is the date upon which imported dogs will become subject to detention under quarantine for a period of six months at a Veterinary establishment approved for the purpose. By this means the Board hope to minimize the inconvenience which may be caused by the movement of dogs out of Great Britain by persons imperfectly acquainted with the regulations, but they think that a greater service might be rendered to those concerned if the Order and its requirements could be published more widely abroad, and this would appear to be specially desirable in the case of the Colonies.

I am, therefore, desired to ask you to be so good as to move the Secretary of State to cause copies of the Press notice, and of the Order and of the Memorandum A 214/a to be again sent to the Governors of Colonies, The High Commissioner for Canada, and the Agents General and other colonial representatives to whom copies of the Order and the Memorandum have already been forwarded, with a request that steps may be taken to disseminate the information in their respective countries as widely as possible.

The Board feel it their duty to omit no step which may have the result of mitigating the effect of an Order, the enforcement of which, unfortunately, must at first be expected to interfere very considerably with the convenience of a section of the travelling public, and it is upon these grounds that they seek the co-operation and assistance of your Department and of the various Authorities representing the Colonies.

Importation of Dogs.

The Board of Agriculture again desire to draw the special attention of the public to the fact that after the 15th of March next the landing in Great Britain of dogs brought from any country except Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man, will be subject to Article 2 of the Importation of Dogs Order of 1901, which expressly provides that every imported dog must be detained and isolated at the expense of its owner upon premises in the occupation or under the control of a veterinary surgeon, which shall have been previously approved in writing by the Board for that purpose, for a period of six calendar months, during which period the dog may not be moved from the place of detention, except as provided in that Article. This Article does not apply in the case of an imported dog which is intended to be exported from Great Britain within forty-eight hours, or of a performing dog, with regard to the detention and isolation of which special conditions will be imposed by the Licence authorizing its landing.

The Memorandum A 160/A as to the Importation of Dogs into Great Britain from abroad, dated the 8th August, 1900, will cease to have effect when Article 2 of this Order comes into operation.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1901.

In submitting the 70th Annual Report of the working of the Ceylon Savings Bank, it is gratifying to be able to state that the progress in its business has been maintained during the past year, as shown in the appended tabular statements.

The information furnished in these statements tends to show that the facilities afforded by the Bank are appreciated and, as its advantages as a means of making small savings become better known, are more generally availed of by all classes of the community.

The Bank allows interest at the rate of 4 per cent. on all accounts under Rs. 1,000, and 3 per cent. when the total sums deposited amount to Rs. 1,000 and upwards, and it is apparent from the classification of accounts that the depositors have fully availed themselves of the opportunity of making the most of these terms by reducing their balances, thus enabling themselves to claim the higher rate of interest. This is fully borne out by the fact that the largest amount of interest which the Bank has been required to pay to depositors was in the year under review.

- (1) *Accounts opened.*—The largest number during the last ten years.
- (2) *Accounts closed.*—This number is larger than it has been for many years past, but it is due to the fact that there were a large number of deaths amongst depositors, and the money had to be withdrawn for distribution amongst the heirs; also to the fact that many depositors have left the Island temporarily or otherwise and have withdrawn their savings.
- (3) *Number of Deposits* has been larger than in any previous year.
- (4) *Number of Withdrawals* is also larger than in any previous year, and is accounted for under head of "Accounts closed."
- (5) *Amount Deposited.*—The amount is Rs. 216,713 less than was deposited during 1900.
- (6) *Amount Withdrawn.*—This is also much larger than in previous years. The reason given under items (2) and (4) is probably the cause of this increase.
- (7) *Number of Depositors* shows an increase of 2,147 new depositors over the previous year.
- (8) *Amount to Credit of Depositors.*—This item shows a decrease of Rs. 31,828, and is no doubt attributable to the same cause as stated under headings (2), (4), and (6); and also to the fact that as soon as a depositor has a fairly large sum to his credit he withdraws this amount in order to invest it at a higher rate of interest than is allowed by the Bank.

The distribution of accounts shows that the number of new accounts opened by residents during the past twelve months has been well distributed throughout all the Provinces, and that the depositors include persons of twenty-one nationalities.

The Directors have been able to invest the funds on loans on house property during 1901 to the extent of Rs. 110,525, showing an increase of Rs. 38,141 over money borrowed in 1900. This increase is however to some extent due to the fact that larger amounts due on old loans have been repaid during this period than has been the case for some years past.

A large number of applications from intending borrowers had to be refused owing to the funds available under the Savings Bank Ordinance for these investments having been fully lent.

THE ENGLISH UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP, 1904.

ONE Scholarship of the value of £200 per annum, tenable for four years, and an outfit allowance of £50, will be awarded by the Government of Ceylon on the results of a special examination, to be conducted by the Oxford and Cambridge School Examination Board, which will be held at the Colombo School of Agriculture on the third Monday in March, 1904, and following days.

No candidate will be admitted to this examination who has not been resident in the Island for the five years next before the examination, or who was born on or before the 31st day of March, 1884, or who has not previously passed the "London Matriculation Examination," or the "Cambridge Senior Local Examination" with honours, or the "First in Arts Examination" of the Calcutta University. A certificate of birth must be furnished by candidates whose birth certificates are not already filed at the Office of Public Instruction.

N.B.—(1) Managers of Schools and Principals of Colleges should notify to the Director of Public Instruction on or before October 1, 1903, the number of candidates they intend to present for the examination, together with the particulars mentioned in the preceding paragraph.

(2) In future the certificate of a Medical Officer, appointed by Government, as to physical fitness to prosecute studies in the British Isles will be an essential condition of the English University Scholarship. For such a certificate the candidate should pay a fee of Rs. 10-50.

N.B.—The fee payable is Rs. 40 for each candidate, unless otherwise notified.

The subjects for the examination are as follows:—

1. English Essay.
2. The English Language.—Questions on English Grammar and Idiom, and such questions on the Philology and History of the Language as can be answered without a special knowledge of Anglo-Saxon.
3. English Literature.—The period will be 1660 to 1727 A.D. The subjects will be Shakespeare: *Much Ado about Nothing*; *Macbeth*; *King John*. Milton: *Paradise Lost*, Books I., II., IV., VII. Johnson: *Lives of Dryden and Pope*. *Charles Lamb: Essays of Elia*, First Series.
4. English History.—The special period will be 1625 to 1714 A.D.
5. Mathematics.
 - Arithmetic*.—Plane Geometry, including the subjects treated in Euclid, Books I., II., III., IV., VI., and XI., to proposition 21 inclusive.
 - Algebra, as far as, but not including, the Theory of Numbers.
 - Plane Trigonometry, including De Moivre's Theorem and its simpler applications.
 - Elementary Geometrical Conic Sections.
 - Analytical Geometry: (a) Equations in rectangular and Polar Co-ordinates of (1) the straight line; (2) the Circle; (3) the Parabola; (4) the Ellipse; (5) the Hyperbola; and the properties of the same; (b) Change of Axes.
6. Applied Mathematics.
 - Statics*.—Composition, Resolution, and Equilibrium of Forces: (1) acting at a point; (2) acting in a plane; (3) acting in parallel lines. The properties of the Centre of Gravity; the Laws of Friction; the Mechanical Powers; and the Principle of Virtual Work.
 - Dynamics*.—Definition and Measurement of Mass, Force, Velocity, Acceleration, Momentum, Work, and Energy, Composition and Resolution of Velocities and Accelerations. Laws of Motion. Uniform and uniformly accelerated motion in a straight line. Free motion of projectiles under the action of gravity. Circular motion of particles. Simple cases of impact.
 - Hydrostatics*.—Nature, intensity, and transmission of pressure in Liquids. Pressure of Liquids in equilibrium under the action of gravity. Equilibrium of Solids floating or immersed in gravitating Liquids. Specific gravities of substances. Solid and Liquid. The Laws of Elastic Fluids and the principle of the barometer, thermometer, siphon, diving bell, manometer, and the various pumps.
7. Science.—Not more than two of the following sections:—
 - (a) Inorganic Chemistry, Theoretical.
 - The chief chemical and physical properties of the atmosphere, and its relation to animal and vegetable life. Combustion, flame.
 - The chief chemical and physical properties of water, natural waters, their principal impurities, hardness. Hydrogen Peroxide.
 - The chief sources and properties of hydrogen and oxygen, and of carbon, sulphur, phosphorus, nitrogen. Chlorine, bromine, and iodine, and their chief compounds with hydrogen and oxygen.
 - Allotropy of elements.
 - Combining proportions by weight and volume. Atomic theory. Avogadro's law symbols, equations, nomenclature. Simple chemical calculations relating to weight and volume.
 - Nature of salts.
 - The general characteristics of metals as a class. The chief sources and properties of silver, copper, mercury, lead, aluminium, iron, zinc, calcium, and sodium; and of their principal oxides, carbonate, sulphates, chlorides, and nitrates.
 - (b) Inorganic Chemistry, Practical, including Analysis (qualitative only) of mixtures of not more than two Acids and two Bases. Simple problems or exercises on the subjects of the syllabus in theoretical chemistry.
 - (c) Heat.—Expansion of Solids, Liquids, and Gases. Laws relating thereto. Thermometry, Calorimetry, Specific Heat, Liquefaction, and Solidification, Vaporization and Condensation, Ebullition, Properties of Vapour (saturated and unsaturated), Latent Heat, Change of state, transmission of Heat by Conduction, Convection, and Radiation. The mechanical equivalent of Heat.
 - Light.—Propagation of Light in straight lines in uniform media. Velocity of Light and modes of determining it. Intensity of Light, its variation with distance. Shadows. Photometry. Reflection and Refraction at plane surfaces. Formation of images by plane and spherical mirrors and by simple lenses (excluding aberration.) Decomposition of white light by a prism. The prismatic spectrum.
 - (d) Electricity.—The two electrical states and their mutual relations. Attraction and Repulsion, Conduction and Insulation. Electrostatic Induction. The common plate and cylinder electrical machines. Electrical condensers. Distribution of electricity upon conductors. Current

* These subjects will be repeated in the Examination of 1905.

electricity. Common forms of battery. Ohm's Law and its simple applications. Heating. Chemical and magnetic effects of electric currents. Simple experimental methods of generating currents by relative motion of conductors and magnets. The simple laws of magneto-electric induction.

Magnetism.—Simple experimental properties of magnets. Effect of a magnet on a neighbouring piece of soft iron or of hard steel. Terrestrial magnetism; behaviour of a declination needle and of a dipping needle at different parts of the earth's surface.

- (e) Botany.—The elements of the Morphology and Physiology of the flowering plant. The parts of the flower and their functions with special reference to fertilization. Fruits and seeds, with their provisions for preservation and dispersion. Elementary facts in the nutrition of the flowering plant. Classification of flowering plants with special reference to the principal natural orders. The structure and properties of the cell treated from an elementary point of view. The description of the flowering plant in technical language. The paper will include questions on the Flora of Ceylon.
