BENGAL.—No. 131.

Pacific Ocean—Fiji Islands—Cape Washington, Koro, Wakaya—Lights established.

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 35, dated February 22, 1902, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 218 of 1902) that the under-mentioned lights would be established at Cape Washington, Kandavu island, and at Koro island on March 1, and on Wakaya reef on April 1, 1902:—

(1) Cape Washington is a white fixed dioptric light of the fourth order, elevated 208 ft. above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of about 16 miles. It is shown from a white square tower 28 ft. high, erected on the summit of the cape.

Approximate position: lat. $19^{\circ} 6\frac{3}{4}'$ S., long. $177^{\circ} 57\frac{3}{4}'$ E.

(2) Koro island light is a red fixed dioptric light of the fourth order, elevated 200 ft. above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of 15 miles. It is shown from a white square tower 30 ft. high, erected on Vanaku point.

Approximate position: lat. $17^{\circ} 22\frac{1}{4}'$ S., long. $179^{\circ} 25\frac{3}{4}'$ E.
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(3) Wakaya light is a white fixed dioptric light of the third order, elevated about 75 ft. above high water, and visible in clear weather from a distance of about 14 miles. It is shown from a white hexagonal tower 70 ft. high, erected on black piles, situated on the southern extremity of Wakaya reef.

Approximate position: lat. $17^{\circ} 41\frac{1}{2}'$ S., long. $179^{\circ} 43'$ E.

Australia, South—Port Adelaide River—Outer Harbour, Light's Passage—Bores put down between the Occulting Light Buoy and No. 2 Beacon Light.

The President Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 5 of 1902) that bores are being put down between the occulting light buoy and the No. 2 beacon light, and during the continuance of the work an ordinary riding light will be exhibited from a temporary staging erected where such bores are being worked.

Australia South—Point Sinclair, West Coast—A Mooring Buoy placed off the Landing.

The President, Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 6 of 1902) that a mooring buoy has been placed off the landing at Point Sinclair. The mooring is placed in 20 ft. at low water springtides and within a radius of 200 ft.; the depth at L. W. S. is nowhere less than 15 ft.

Australia, South—Waterloo Bay, West Coast—Leading Beacons.

The President, Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 7 of 1902) that the two black beacons on the foreshore which formerly led into Waterloo bay have been removed, and in lieu thereof two beacons with triangular-shaped heads have been erected. The lower or seaward beacon is painted red and the landward one white, and bear N. E. by N., as previously, leading over the deepest part of the bar approaching or leaving the bay.

BENGAL.—No. 137.

Australia, South—Smoky and Streaky Bays—Smoky Bay—West Coast—Ballast Ground—Pile Beacons erected.

The President, Marine Board, Port Adelaide, has given notice (No. 8 of 1902) that two pile beacons with square white heads have been erected on the western side of Décrés bay to mark the eastern boundary of the area within which ballast may be deposited. The north beacon is placed on the extreme N. E. point of St. Peter's Spit, in 6 ft. at L. W. S.; Cape Vivonne bearing W. N. W., distant one and a quarter mile. The south beacon bears S. $\frac{1}{2}$ R. from the north one, three and a half miles distant; and stands in 6 ft. L. W. S. All ballast must be deposited to westward of the line of beacons.

Streaky Bay—Two Piles with Square White Heads erected.

Two piles with square white heads have been erected on the south side of the North sand to mark the S. E. boundary of the area within which ballast may be

deposited. The N. E. beacon is near the east end of North sand, in 10 ft. L. W. S.; and the S. W. beacon stands in 7 ft. L. W. S., bearing south-west two and three-quarter miles distant. These two beacons and the two outer buoys marking Dashwood channel are approximately in line. Ballast may be deposited only to the N. W. of an imaginary line joining the two beacons.

India, West—Malabar Coast—Cochin—Non-existence of Wreck—Removal of Buoy.

The Bombay Government has given notice (No. 47 of 1902) that the wreck marked off Cochin in 5½ fathoms on Admiralty Chart No. 749, India, West Coast, Tannore to Cundacudva, no longer exists; also the red buoy in 3½ to 4½ fathoms at Narakal was removed in 1894.

New Zealand—South Island, West Coast—Bruce Bay Approach—Positions and Particulars of Post and Tutanekei Rocks.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 234 of 1902) that Captain Post of the N. Z. Government vessel Tutanekei reports the existence of the under-mentioned rocks in the northern approach to Bruce bay:—

(a) Post rock is a ridge-shaped rock about 20 ft. long, which uncovers at low water springs, and is situated with Makawhi point (the point about one mile to the northward of Makawhi river), bearing S. 21° W., distant 3 miles.

(b) Tutanekei rock is a rock with a depth of 12 ft. over it at low water springs, situated with Makawhi point, bearing east, distant one mile.

Approximate position, Makawhi point: lat. 43° 32½' S. long 169° 41¼' E.

Variation: 15° easterly in 1902.

Eastern Archipelago—Sumatra, West Coast—Simalur Island—Reefs North-Westward of Pulo Siumat.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 235 of 1902) that a cluster of coral reefs, with apparently depths of from 2 to 3 fathoms over them, were observed from a position approximately in lat. 2° 40' 50" N., long. 96° 18' 30" E. From this position the reefs extended about 5½ cables in an easterly direction, about 3 cables in a southerly direction, and about 1½ cable in other directions.

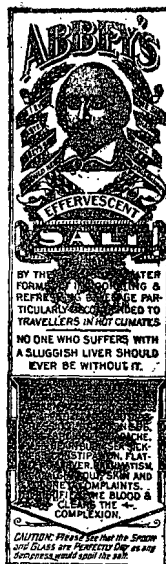
