### BENGAL.—No. 141.

*Eastern Archipelago—Borneo, North-West Coast.—Bruni Bay Approach—Shoal Soundings reported.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 237 of 1901) that information, dated March 8, 1902, has been received from Commander F. H. Peyton, H.M.S. Vestal, that the following shoal sounding was obtained from on

board his vessel in the under-mentioned position in th approach to Bruni bay:—

A sounding of about 3 fathoms at low water, situated with Pelong rocks, bearing N. 86° E., distant 8½ miles, and Keti islet S. 31° W. From this position the depth gradually increased in a N. 11° W. direction, 4 fathoms being obtained close to the 10-fathom contour line on the Chart; after which it increased rapidly a depth of 13 fathoms low water, being obtained with Pelong rocks bearing S. 69° E., distant 10 miles, and Great Rusukan island N. 78° E.

Approximate position, Pelong rocks: lat. 5° 5' N., long. 115° 2½' E.

Variation, 2° easterly in 1902.

*Eastern Archipelago—Borneo, South Coast—Cape Selatan—Shoal reported.*

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 238 of 1902) that Mr. L. E. Snape, Master of the ss. Petriana, reports that a sounding of 4 fathoms was obtained from

on board his vessel on March 8, 1902, situated with the extremity of Cape Selatan, bearing N. 58° W. The nature of the bottom was not obtained, nor was the shoal considered to be of any great extent.

Approximate position : lat. 4° 15' S., long. 114° 45' E.  
Variation, 2° easterly in 1902.

*Eastern Archipelago—Java, North Coast—Batavia  
Light—Character altered.*

With reference to Notice to Mariners No. 99, dated April 18, issued by this office, the British Admiralty has given further notice (No. 241 of 1902) that the character of the light on the western mole at Batavia has been altered from fixed and flashing to a white occulting light every twenty seconds, thus : light, ten seconds ; eclipse, ten seconds.

*Australia—Coral Sea—Uncharted Reef, Eastward of Middle  
Bellona Shoals.*

The Acting Port Master, Brisbane, has given notice (No. 2 of 1902) of the existence of an uncharted reef and sandbank in the following approximate position :—

Lat., North end, 20° 32' S.

Long., 159° 35' E.

It is about 3½ miles long and encloses a lagoon.

In lat. 21° 25' S., long. 159° 27' E., another uncharted reef was seen with the remains of a wreck of a wooden vessel of about 200 tons.

As these dangers are reported to exist about 30 miles to the eastward of the Middle Bellona shoal, vessels are cautioned to exercise care and keep a good lookout when navigating that portion of the Coral sea.

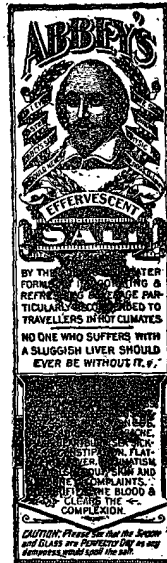

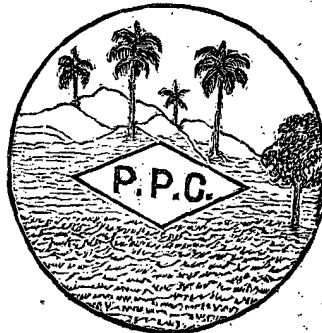
