MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

Minutes of Proceedings of a General Meeting of the Municipal Council of Colombo held at the Municipal Office on Friday, March 14, 1902.

The Council met this day at 3 P.M., pursuant to notice dated March 8, 1902.

Present :—Mr. A. S. Pagden, Chairman; Mr. A. Perry; Dr. J. L. Vanderstraaten; Mr. A. de A. Seneviratne; the Hon. Mr. F. A. Cooper, C.M.G.; Major L. F. Knollys, C.M.G.; Mr. P. D. Warren; the Hon. Mr. Giles F. Walker; Mr. Chas. Perera; Mr. Chas. P. Dias; Mr. R. H. Morgan; Mr. Arthur Alvis; Mr. James Peiris; Mr. H. A. Jayewardene; and Mr. M. L. M. Zainudeen.

The Minutes of February 14, 1902, having been printed and a copy thereof having been sent to each Member of the Council, were taken as read.

Resolved—That the Minutes of February 14, 1902, be confirmed.

1. Pursuant to notice the Hon. Mr. Giles F. Walker moved—That the two by-laws, as below, be approved and submitted to His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council:—

- It shall be lawful for any person claiming to be the owner of any house, building, or land appearing in the Municipal Council's assessment book to register at the office of the Council his name and address and the assessment number of the property so claimed by him, and the name of the street in which it is situated, and he shall thereupon be entitled to have left at or posted to the address so registered a copy of the annual notice of assessment of the property so claimed by him.
- It shall be lawful for the Chairman to cause any horse used or intended to be used in drawing any vehicle licensed under Ordinance No. 9 of 1901 to be branded on the hoof with such mark or number as the Chairman may determine, and any person using or permitting to be used for drawing any such vehicle any horse which has not been so branded shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine not exceeding twenty rupees.

Major L. F. Knollys seconded.—Carried.

2. Pursuant to notice Mr. R. H. Morgan presented a petition from M. Ibrahim Saibo and Chappan Hamit of the Slave Island mutton market, and moved that the same be considered.

Mr. James Peiris seconded.
The petition was thereupon read.

Perera moved—That in future whenever a copy of the by-laws of this Council is sent to the Clerk of the Legislative Council, in terms of section 7 of the Ordinance No. 8 of 1901, copies of the same be circulated also among the Members of this Council, and by leave of Council added the words "provided that the Government Printer be able to supply the copies required, and that the Chairman be authorized to pay, if necessary, for any copies required."

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO, CEYLON.

Wanted a Medical Officer of Health for the City of Colombo.

The appointment will be for a period of five years from the date of taking up duties in Colombo. The salary will be Rs. 6,000, equivalent to £400, for the first two years; Rs. 6,750, equal to £450, for the third and fourth year; and Rs. 7,500, equal to £500, for the last year. A conveyance allowance of Rs. 80 a month, equal to £64 a year, will be paid in addition to the salary throughout the five years. Candidates for the post must hold a diploma in Sanitary Science, Public Health, or State Medicine, in addition to their ordinary medical qualification. The selected candidate will be required to submit a medical certificate that he is fit for service in the tropics. On his doing so, a first class passage to Colombo will be provided for him. The officer appointed will be required to reside in Colombo, and will be debarred from private practice or employment outside the duties of his office.

At the end of the period of five years it will be optional for the Council to engage the Medical Officer for such further period, and on such terms as may be agreed on should he desire to be re-engaged.

Should the Council not re-engage him at the end of the five years, a first class passage to England will be provided for him at any time during the six months next following the termination of the five years. Should the officer be compelled at any time during the five years to relinquish his appointment owing to ill-health contracted through no fault of his own, a first class passage to England will be provided, and the agreement will thereupon be determined.

Candidates should address their applications stating age, general qualifications, and qualifications for office as a Medical Officer of Health, with such testimonials as they may desire to submit.

BUSINESS.

1. Letter from Colonial Secretary, forwarding a copy of Ordinance to provide for the registration of dogs and inviting attention to section 4 thereof, and draft by-laws framed under section 5.

The Committee suggest the addition of the words "by the Chairman after notice to be left at the address of the owner" after the words "to be cancelled," in line 2 of by-law 6. They are of opinion that that by-law 6 (d) should be omitted, and the subject of it dealt with by a by-law under section 122 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887. They recommend the by-laws as amended above to the Council. Mr. C. Perera proposed to include in these by-laws section 304 (copy annexed) of the new draft general by-laws at present before Government. The other Members of the Committee are of opinion that this is not necessary.

I would wish a slight alteration made in rule 6 sub-section (a). After the words "as to be" I would wish some words to the following effect inserted: "incurable and to be."

The clause would then run thus:—Should the dog become so maimed or diseased as to be incurable and to be in the opinion, &c.

ARTHUR ALVIS.

I agree with Mr. Chas. Perera with regard to the inclusion of section 304 of the new by-laws in these by-laws. In by-law 6 (b) I would suggest the words "is habitually ill-treated" instead of the words "has been ill-treated."

Proviso. 304. Provided always that any order or decision made by the Chairman in the exercise of any power vested in him under the foregoing by-laws shall be open to revision by the Municipal Council,

By-laws made by the Municipal Council under Section 5 of Ordinance No. 25 of 1901.

1. It shall be lawful for the Chairman of the Municipal Council from time to time to require every occupier of a house to furnish a return showing the number and description of dogs kept in such house or premises attached thereto and the names of the persons to whom they belong, and every such occupier shall be bound to furnish such return filled in with correct information within one week after being so required to furnish it.

2. The Chairman of the Municipal Council may refuse to issue a certificate of registration for any dog which in his opinion is so maimed or diseased as to be unfit to live, or which in his opinion is ill-treated or neglected by its owner or the person in possession of it.

3. It shall be lawful for the Chairman to require the production of any dog for which registration is applied for, and to decline to issue a certificate of registration until it is produced.

4. A fee of 75 cents shall be charged for each certificate issued.

5. A collar with the certificate number stamped on it will be issued in respect of each dog registered should the person applying for the certificate so require. A charge of 10 cents will be made for each collar issued.

6. Certificates for dogs shall have the following conditions attached thereto:—

The certificate is liable to be cancelled by the Chairman after notice to be left at the address of the owner.

(a) Should the dog become so maimed or diseased as to be incurable, and to be in the opinion of the Chairman or Municipal Veterinary Surgeon unfit to live.

(b) Should the Chairman be satisfied that the dog is habitually ill-treated or continually neglected by its owner.

(c) Should the dog be permitted by its owner to associate with dogs belonging to others at a time when it is suffering from any infectious or contagious disease.

7. The owner of every dog for which a certificate has been refused or cancelled because the conditions attached to the certificate have not been complied with, shall, on being noticed to do so, produce the dog at the Municipal dog pound at a time to be stated in the notice and deliver it over to the pound keeper.

QUARRY AT HILL HOUSE.

The scheme adopted by the Council was to acquire the whole 13 acres 1 rood 16'86 perches shown in the original plan prepared by the Superintendent of Works. On laying this before Government for permission to acquire the land, in which Hill House grounds (property of Government and 4A. 2R. 35P. in extent) were included, I found that Government was only prepared to let the Council take up a portion in extent 6A. OR. 25'76P. This portion excludes Hill House grounds entirely and only includes 1A. 2R. 13'44P. of actual quarrying ground. I pointed out to Government that the Council doubted the advisability of undertaking anything short of the whole scheme, and asked for permission to acquire the rest of the land, but it was refused. I then consulted the Government Agent, as I had reason to believe that his recommendation would carry weight with Government, and I found that he was prepared to recommend an additional amount of 4R. 33P. (a part of Hill House grounds) being acquired. This will provide for four years' work, against only two years provided for by the scheme Government was prepared to allow, and against eleven years' work under the scheme adopted by the Council. The Government Agent is of opinion that by the time the Council has worked through the portion which he is prepared to recommend being acquired, the Breakwater quarries will be available, and for this reason he is not prepared to recommend any more land being taken up. The scheme thus being materially altered, I thought it necessary to reduce its cost as much as possible, and propose the omission of about 3 acres of land provided in the original scheme for a road and for a stone depôt, as the road is not absolutely necessary, and the metal would be broken in the quarry limits. I referred this modified scheme to the Superintendent of Works, who estimates it will cost Rs. 58,100 against Rs. 200,000 for the original scheme, and that the cost of metal will work out to Rs. 12'81 a cube instead of to Rs. 10'50 as under the original scheme. The whole cost of the modified scheme has been charged against the metal output, whereas in the original scheme only interest was so charged. This is because the land, which would have been a valuable asset had the whole scheme been carried out, will not be so under the modified one. The question for the Council to decide is whether the modified scheme should be carried out or the whole project abandoned.

BY-LAWS MADE BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL UNDER SECTIONS 4 AND 5 OF ORDINANCE NO. 8 OF 1901.

Every person driving, drawing, pushing, riding, or having the charge of any carriage, cart, jinricksha, handcart, wheelbarrow, bicycle, tricycle, velocipede, motor car, or any other vehicle, or having the charge of or riding any horse or other animal in the roads or streets within the Municipality in Colombo, shall keep to the left or near side of the road except when such person is overtaking another vehicle or animal, in which case such person shall pass on the right or off side of the said vehicle or animal and shall at once return to the left or near side of the road, and in no case shall such person pass on the right or off side of any signboard which may be erected by the Municipal Council.

Every carriage, cart, jinricksha, or other vehicle mentioned in rule 1, and every horse or other animal which may be required to stand for any period in any street or road within the Municipality in Colombo, shall be drawn up or made to stand as close to the side of the road as is possible, and in the case of a vehicle its shafts shall be parallel with the road, but this rule shall not apply to any place or station which may be appointed by the Municipal Council as a stand for carriages, jinrickshas, or other vehicles.

Any person committing a breach of any of the foregoing rules shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable on conviction to the penalty provided under section 303 of the Council's new by-laws.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on Saturday, January 18, 1902, at 8 o'clock a.m., in accordance with Notice dated January 14, 1902.

Present:—Hon. Mr. H. Wace, Chairman; J. H. Sproule, Esq.; W. D. Gibbon, Esq.; C. Vanderwall, Esq.; R. W. Jonklaas, Esq.; L. Creasy, Esq.; Dr. J. Craib; P. T. Habeeboo Lebbe, Esq.

1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Regular and a Special Meeting held on December 21 were read, confirmed, and signed by the Chairman.

2. The following documents were submitted:—Statements of Receipts and Expenditure from close of 1900 to December 31, 1901, on account of the Municipal Fund, comprising the (No. 1) General Revenue, (No. 2) Consolidated Rate (Police and Lighting), and (No. 3) Water-rate Accounts; Progress Report of Works done brought up to the same date; Health Officer's Report for, and Statement of Cases instituted by the several Inspectors during, the month of December.

Resolved—That the several statements, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 90 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887, and the Health Officer's report, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries inspected during December and register.

4. Return of burials in the General Cemetery at Mahaiyawa to end of 1901 was laid on the table.

5. The following correspondence was submitted and read:—

(a) Memorandum dated January 6 from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding copy of letter No. 12 of January 6 to the Inspector-General of Police, intimating that the Governor has been pleased to sanction the employment of prison labour for the widening of Bogambra recreation ground, provided the Municipal Council are prepared to pay the cost of any extra guards and of tools and of fences for isolating the prisoners.

Resolved that the terms be accepted.

It was proposed by Mr. Sproule, and seconded by Mr. Vanderwall, that the thanks of the Council be tendered to His Excellency the Governor for the concession accorded for free prison labour to extend the Bogambra recreation ground, and for the interest His Excellency takes in the improvement of the town of Kandy.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

(b) Read letter No. 5, dated January 9, 1902, from the Government Agent, forwarding copy of letter from the Inspector-General of Prisons, asking that the Assistant Superintendent, Bogambra Jail, be supplied with hand carts and tools for use of prisoners widening the recreation ground: also letter from the Superintendent of Prisons, Kandy, requesting authority to employ two extra guards at a cost of Rs. 15 per mensem and half diet, to assist officers in improving the recreation ground.

Resolved—That the employment of two extra guards at Rs. 15 per month each and half diet be sanctioned and provision be made in the next Supplementary Budget, and that any hand carts and tools required be supplied.

(c) Read letter No. 1, dated January 10, 1902, from the Colonial Secretary, intimating the sanction by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council of the taxes proposed to be levied during 1902, as conveyed in Chairman's letter No. 51 of December 28, 1901.

(d) Read letter No. 2, dated January 10, 1902, from the Colonial Secretary, intimating the sanction by His Excellency the Governor in Executive Council to the levy during 1902 of a police and lighting rate of 6 per cent. as per Chairman's letter No. 50 of December 28, 1901.

(e) Read letter No. 502, dated January 11, 1902, from the Superintendent of Police, in reply to the Secretary's letter of November 22, 1901, stating that steps have been taken to prevent beggars from frequenting the bund and from molesting passengers or causing annoyance.

6. Petition dated January 17, 1902, from rickshaw owners was submitted and read.

Resolved—That petitioners be informed that the proposed alteration of the by-laws relating to carriages and jinrickshas has been adopted by the Municipal Council and submitted to His Excellency the Governor for approval, and the Council now declines to reconsider the by-laws.

7. Read report (Appendix A) by Special Committee appointed on September 21, 1901, to consider several petitions from certain residents praying for a reduction of the charge for removal of night soil.

Proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. Habeeboo Lebbe, that the report just read be adopted.

On being put to the Meeting the resolution was carried *nem. con.*

8. Read report (Appendix B) by the Special Committee appointed on October 26, 1901, to consider letter from members of the Clerical Staff praying that a scheme be devised for the granting of annual increment of salary.

It was proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, and seconded by Mr. Habeeboo Lebbe, that consideration of the report be postponed till the next Meeting to allow full opportunity for consideration of the recommendation of the Committee. This was agreed to, and it was ordered that the report be circulated in the meantime.

9. It being necessary to appoint a Standing Committee for the year, under section 88 of the Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, it was unanimously resolved that the number of Members of the Standing Committee, exclusive of the Chairman, be fixed at four.

The ballot was then taken, and after scrutiny of the votes the Chairman declared the following Members to have been elected Members of the Standing Committee for 1902:—Messrs. Sproule, Beven, Vanderwall, and Creasy—three to form a quorum.

10. It was unanimously resolved that the following Members be appointed a Special Committee to consider and deal with questions connected with the water supply during 1902, viz.:—The Chairman, Messrs. Beven, Gibbon, Jonklaas, and Creasy.

11. Resolved—That Messrs. Gibbon and Jonklaas be nominated to represent the Council on the Committee of the Kandy Volunteer and Public Band.

12. Report (Appendix C) by the Special Committee appointed on January 19, 1901, to deal with question of revised rules and regulations relating to water supply, was submitted and read.

Proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, seconded by Mr. Habeeboo Lebbe, that the suggestion of two Members of the Special Committee that the recovery of rent for meters shall be limited to their actual cost be adopted, and that a rule to this effect be appended to the by-law relating to rents.

On a division being called, the following votes were recorded :—

APPENDIX A.

Charges for removal of Night Soil.

Your Committee appointed on September 21, 1901, to consider several petitions from certain residents within the Municipality praying for a reduction of the charges for removal of night soil, have to recommend that the rates ruling within the Colombo Municipality, as provided under by-law 10, published in the *Government Gazette* on December 31, 1897, be adopted, and that the first portion of the Kandy Council's by-law 3 (d) of May 17, 1898, be amended as follows :—

Every such person so employing a Municipal officer for the removal of night soil shall pay to the said Municipal Council in advance the sum of Rs. 2 per mensem for each standard bucket in which such night soil is deposited on his premises for removal by such officer, provided that in the case of any house, building, land, or tenement assessed for Municipal rates at the annual value of less than Rs. 400 the sum payable per standard bucket shall be Re. 1 only per mensem.

Correspondence Clerk, to commence on Rs. 600 and rise to Rs. 1,100 by bi-annual increments of Rs. 83-33.
Assessment Clerk, to commence on Rs. 500 and rise to Rs. 960 on above terms.
Assistant Clerk, to commence on Rs. 240 and rise to Rs. 500 on the above terms.
Storekeeper, to commence on Rs. 480 and rise to Rs. 600 on the above terms.
Interpreter, Shroff, Judicial Clerk, to commence on Rs. 840 and rise to Rs. 1,200 on the above terms.
Above salaries to be in full remuneration of all services required of each clerk.
Secretary to be allowed to employ an extra clerk, on vote, not to exceed Rs. 240 per annum.
Assessment Clerk and the Storekeeper to be under the supervision of the Accountant.

APPENDIX C.

CHAPTER XII.

Municipal Water Service.

Water-rate how recoverable.

1. The water-rate which the Municipality is authorized and empowered by "The Kandy Waterworks Loan Ordinances, 1884 and 1895," to impose and enforce, and any other sums which may become due under the provisions of this chapter, shall be leviable as if the same were a tax imposed under "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887."

Appointment of officers.

2. It shall be lawful for the Council to appoint such officers as may be necessary to execute the works and to carry out the duties hereinafter mentioned, and pay them such salaries or allowances as the Council shall deem right.

Expenses of collection, &c., to be paid from water-rate.

3. All expenses incurred in or about the supply of water and in the collection of the water-rate shall be defrayed from the proceeds of such water-rate.

Waterworks vested in Council.

4. All public tanks, reservoirs, cistern, standpipes, fountains, sluices, wells, conduits, pipes, pumps, and other waterworks existing within the Municipality at the time of the coming into operation of these by-laws, or afterwards made, laid, or erected, and all buildings, works, materials, and things connected with or appertaining to such waterworks shall be vested in the Council.

Council may provide filtering tanks, &c.

5. The Council may cause such filtering tanks, reservoirs, aqueducts, or other works to be constructed, and such fountains and standpipes to be erected, and such pipes to be laid as it may from time to time consider necessary for the use of the inhabitants of the Municipality.

Power to break up streets, &c., and enter private land.

6. In laying down any such pipes, the Council may, if it consider it necessary, carry such pipes through, across, or under any street, or place laid out or intended for a street, or under any building or through any cellar or vault, or into, through, or under any enclosed or other land whatsoever. Provided that the Council shall in every case in which it deals with private property under this by-law give notice of its intention to do so to the owner of such property, and shall on completion of the work pay to him reasonable compensation. If any dispute shall arise as to the amount or apportionment of such compensation, such amount and apportionment shall be summarily ascertained and determined by the Magistrate, whose decision shall be subject to an appeal to the Supreme Court.

No person to foul water

7. No person shall do anything whereby the water in any reservoir, fountain, cistern, standpipe, pipes, or other waterworks belonging to the Council shall be in any degree polluted, fouled, or corrupted, and no person shall in any way damage or tamper with any such waterworks.

or to wash at any standpost, &c.

8. No person shall bathe or wash any part of his body, or wash any cattle, horse, dog, or other animal whatsoever, or any vehicle, clothes, utensils, or other article whatsoever, at or near any reservoir, standpost, fountain, cistern, pipe, or other waterworks vested in the Council, whether now existing or to be hereafter erected or built, in the streets, thoroughfares, or other public places within the Municipality.

Persons paying rate entitled to free use of water for domestic purposes.

9. Every person paying the water-rate mentioned in by-law 1 of this chapter shall be entitled to have, free of further charge in respect thereof, a supply of water from the public Municipal fountains or standpipes for the domestic use of himself and his household.

Water to be removed in buckets.

10. Water shall only be taken from the public standpipes in buckets or other suitable receptacles, and in such a manner as to prevent its flow into any drain, side channel, or on to the surface of any road, footpath, or area.

No hose is to be attached to any standpost.

11. No hose-pipe, pipe, tube, shoot, or other contrivance of any nature whatsoever shall be attached either temporarily or permanently to any public standpost except at the instance of the Municipal Council for public purposes.

"Domestic purposes," what not included in.

12. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water for horses or cattle, or for washing vehicles, where such horses, cattle, or vehicles are kept for sale or hire, or a supply for any trade, manufacture, or business, or for fountains or swimming baths, or for any ornamental or mechanical purpose, or for purposes of irrigation.

Council may allow private service.

13. The Council may at its discretion, on application by the owner or occupier of any house, allow a private service of water to such house for domestic purposes in such quantities and under such conditions as the Council shall deem reasonable. When a private service is allowed, the connection between the Municipal main and the premises to be served, as well as the necessary service pipes and fittings, shall be made, laid, and affixed by Municipal workmen under the supervision of the Superintendent of Works at the expense of the person applying for such private service. The Council may require the estimated cost of such private service to be paid into the Municipal fund before the work in connection therewith is commenced.

Inlet to bath, lavatory, &c.

14. The inlet of every bath, lavatory, basin, or sink must be separated and distinct from the outlet, and the inlet must be situated at the top or above such bath, lavatory, basin, or sink.

Water pipes not liable to be seized for debt.

15. No communication pipe or service pipes or fittings shall be liable to be seized for any debt.

Pipes not to be laid from mains to the house without sanction of Council.

16. No person shall lay or have any communication or service pipe or pipes for the conveyance of water from any of the Municipal mains into any house, land, or premises, or alter, extend, or disconnect any existing service pipes without the sanction or consent, in writing, of the Council; nor shall any such pipes be laid except by the employes of the Council; nor until the Council shall have approved of the point or place at or through which the same shall be laid.

Council not liable to damage.

17. The Municipal Council, notwithstanding that its requirements have been complied with as regards services, does not hold itself liable for any damage that may arise in premises by bursting or overflowing of any pipe, meter, tap, or connection, nor will the Municipal Council, by any permission or act, extend its responsibility beyond the main pipes in the public thoroughfares.

Communication pipes for groups of houses.

18. Unless the Council shall otherwise permit, every house or premises to which water has been or may hereafter be laid on shall have its own separate communication pipe, and no house shall have more than one communication pipe, or have its service pipes connected with any service pipe, cistern, or other water fittings of any other house.

Council may order removal of pipes laid without leave and recover expenses.

19. If any person shall, contrary to the provisions of the preceding by-laws, lay, or alter, or extend any communication or service pipe or pipes, it shall be lawful for the Council to direct and order the said pipe or pipes to be removed; and if the same be not removed within three days of the service of notice upon such person requiring him to do so, the Council may cause the same to be removed, and the expenses thereby incurred shall be ascertained and determined and recovered from such person in the manner provided by sections 281 and 282 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," as if the same were expenses directed to be paid by the said Ordinance.

Communication of pipes.

20. No pipes for the conveyance of, or in connection with, the water supplied by the Council shall communicate with any cistern, butt, or other receptacle used or intended to be used for rain water.

- Cistern to have ball valve. 21. Every cistern to which water is supplied from the waterworks is to be provided with an "equilibrium" ball valve of approved pattern, and the ball valve is to be so adjusted as to close the supply when the water level in the cistern is two inches below the edge or overflow, if there be one.
- Inlet pipe. The inlet or supply pipe to every cistern shall be situated above the water-level of such cistern.
- Overflow pipe. The overflow pipes of all cisterns are to be brought out to the outside of the building and shall terminate in a conspicuous position, so that any leakage may be easily detected.
No overflow from any cistern shall on any account be connected with any drain or sewer or with the waste pipe of any bath, sink, or any other sanitary appliance, or with the overflow from any other cistern. Each cistern shall have a separate overflow pipe.
- Outlet pipe. 22. The outlet of every draw-off tap shall be in some open and conspicuous place so that leakage may be easily detected, and in no case shall the outlet be below the top water level in any cistern, tank, or other vessel into which the tap delivers.
- Cisterns in the ground cannot be used for storage of water. 23. No cistern buried or excavated in the ground shall be used for the storage of water supplied by the Council, unless the use of such cistern shall be allowed in writing by the Council.
- Receptacle for storage of water. 24. No wooden receptacle without a proper metallic lining shall be used for the storage of water supplied by the Council.
- Waste of water. 25. No owner or occupier of a house shall allow water from any cistern, pipe, or tap on his premises to run to waste. Should any leakage occur in any communication or service pipe, or in any cistern, tap, or other water fittings in any house or premises, the owner or occupier shall, within twenty-four hours, give notice of the same to the Secretary.
- Leakage to be reported. 26. Should the Council have reason to believe that in any house or premises water from the Municipal waterworks is used by others than the members of the household, or for other than domestic purposes, or is wasted or unduly consumed, it shall be lawful for the Council to fix a meter on the pipe supplying such house or premises, and the owner or occupier shall pay for all water shown by the meter to have been consumed in excess of two thousand gallons for every rupee of water-rate assessed in respect of such house or premises, the sum of one rupee for every thousand gallons of such excess.
- When water improperly used, &c., meter to be affixed. It shall be lawful for the Council to agree with any person to supply water for other than domestic purposes, provided an agreement in the form A in the schedule hereto annexed shall have been entered into with the Chairman of the Municipal Council.
- Supply on agreement. 27. The Council shall provide and fix all meters, and may charge for the use of any such meter such rent as the Council may deem reasonable.
- Council to provide meters. 28. The sums recoverable under either of the two next preceding by-laws shall be recovered in the manner provided by sections 281 and 282 of "The Municipal Councils' Ordinance, 1887," as if the same were expenses directed to be paid by the said Ordinance.
- How sums due to be recovered. 29. The following rents shall be paid to the Municipal Council quarterly and in advance for the use of meters for one quarter or any part of a quarter; such quarters shall be considered to commence on the First day of January, the First day of April, the First day of July, and the First day of October:—

- Meter readings monthly. 30. Meters shall be read once in every month. Whenever a meter is read a memorandum in the form B of the reading shall be left at the premises supplied through it, addressed "The Occupier."
- If meter out of order. 31. If a meter be found to be out of order, or if it be removed for repair or alteration, the fact shall be noted on the memorandum mentioned in rule No. 30. On fixing a new meter or re-fixing the old one, a second memorandum shall be left at the premises supplied through such meter.
The consumption for the time that the meter was out of order, or that the service was without a meter, shall be calculated according to the average rate of daily consumption that obtained during the period between any two successive readings whilst the meter was in good order immediately preceding the removal of the meter.
- If meter out of order average to be taken. 32. If the consumer doubts the accuracy of the meter which measures the water supplied to the premises occupied by him, then the meter shall on demand be tested by the Council. The consumer or any person appointed by him may be present when the meter is tested. The result of the testing shall be binding both on the Council and on the consumer, and the quantity of water indicated by the meter from the first reading of the month, as defined in rule No. 30, shall be corrected according to the result of the test. If the meter be found to indicate correctly, or if it be found to indicate too little, then a fee of Rs. 20 shall be paid to the Council for testing by the person demanding the test.
If the meter be found to indicate too much, then no fee shall be paid for testing.
- Steps to be taken if accuracy of meter doubted. 33. The value of the amount of water consumed during the quarter shall be ascertained and calculated in accordance with the foregoing rules.
- Value of water consumed. 34. An account shall be rendered quarterly of the amount to be paid for the water consumed in the preceding quarter.
The accounts for sums due on account of water shall be rendered in the form C in the schedule, and the amount shall be paid to the Municipality in cash in full within fifteen days of the rendering of such account.
- Accounts quarterly of water consumed.

- Payment within fifteen days. 35. In all cases in which a meter is fixed an account shall be rendered quarterly for the rent of such meter in advance. The account shall be in form C in the schedule, and the amount thereof shall be paid to the Council in cash in full within fifteen days of the rendering of such account.
- Council may remove meter for testing, &c. 36. The Council may from time to time remove any meter for the purpose of testing the accuracy thereof, or for examination or repair, or for the purpose of substituting another, or upon discontinuance of any private service.
- Meter to be repaired only by employes of Council. 37. No meter shall be altered or repaired except under the direction of or by persons employed by the Council. All repairs, except those caused wilfully or negligently, shall be made by the Council free of cost to the consumer; but in the event of damage being wilfully or negligently caused, the owner or occupier of the premises to which the water service is laid shall pay the cost of repair or renewal thereof, as the Council may direct.
- Council may shut off water. 38. It shall be lawful for the Council to stop or cut off the supply of water between such hours as it shall deem necessary.
- Council not liable for failure of water caused by unavoidable circumstances. 39. The Council shall not be liable to any penalty or damages for not supplying water to the Municipality, if the want of such supply arises from any accident or from unusual drought or other unavoidable cause.
- Owner, &c., of house having a private service not to supply water to others. 40. No owner or occupier of any premises having a private water service shall supply to any other person, or wilfully permit him to take, any water from any cistern or pipe in such premises, unless for the purpose of extinguishing a fire, or unless such other person shall also be an occupier having a private service, and the pipes supplying him shall be, without his default, out of repair.
- Misuse of water an offence. 41. No person who has not been allowed a supply of water from the Municipal waterworks for other than domestic purposes shall use for any other than domestic purposes any water supplied to or obtained by him from such waterworks.
- Fittings, &c., how to be paid. 42. In case any special fittings, construction, appliances, or arrangements of any kind shall have been allowed for the supply of water, the owner shall, whenever a change of occupiers occurs, either himself pay the charges previously agreed upon or procure their payment by the new occupier, or remove at his own expense the said special fittings, constructions, appliances, or arrangements to the satisfaction of the Council.
- Council may authorize entering and examination of premises having a private service. 43. Any person authorized by the Council may at any time between eight of the clock in the morning and five of the clock in the evening, after giving one hour's notice to the owner or occupier, enter any building or premises in order to examine the condition of the pipes, works, and fittings therein, and to ascertain if there be any waste or misuse of water. If such person is without reasonable cause refused admittance for the purpose aforesaid, or is prevented without reasonable cause from making such examination, or if necessary preventing waste of water, the Council may stop the supply of water to such building or premises.
- Water may be cut off for contravention of by-laws, &c. 44. The Council may also stop the supply of water to any building or premises having a private supply should the owner or occupier be in default of payment of the water-rate fifteen days after the same has become due, or if such owner or occupier does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of any of the provisions of the by-laws in this chapter, or wrongfully fails to do anything which ought to be done for the prevention of the waste, misuse, undue consumption, or contamination of the water belonging to the Municipal waterworks.
- Persons authorized by Council may enter and cut off pipes, &c. 45. In all cases in which the Council is by these by-laws authorized to cut off or stop the supply of water to any building or premises or to remove any pipe or pipes, and in all cases in which any building or premises having a private service shall have become unoccupied, any person thereto authorized by the Council and his workmen may, after giving six hours' notice to the occupier, if any, or the owner, enter such building or premises between the hours of eight of the clock in the morning and five of the clock in the evening and cut off any pipes by which water shall be conveyed from the Municipal main to such premises, and remove any pipe, meter, or fittings which the Council may be entitled to remove.
- Interpretation clause. 46. Whenever used in this chapter, the words "main" shall mean the pipe and all its branches by which water is conveyed from the Municipal reservoir to the town of Kandy; "Communication pipe" shall mean the pipe which extends from the main up to the stop valve placed at or near the point of entrance into any building or premises; and "Service pipe" shall mean the pipe and all its branches laid from the said stop valve into any building or premises.

SCHEDULE

Form A.

1. Agreement for a supply of water by meter for other than domestic purposes to premises No. _____, street, between _____ (hereinafter styled "the owner") on the one part and _____, Chairman of the Municipal Council (hereinafter styled "the Chairman"), on behalf of the Municipal Council of Kandy, on the other part.

2. In consideration of being allowed a supply of water for other than domestic purposes to the aforesaid premises, the owner hereby agrees to abide by the conditions hereinafter set forth:—

- (a) That the water shall be supplied by a _____ inch meter.
- (b) That the owner shall pay or cause to be paid the sum of Rs. _____ a quarter or any part thereof in advance to the Municipal Council of Kandy for the rent of the meter.
- (c) That the owner shall pay or cause to be paid to the Municipal Council of Kandy at the rate of Rs. _____ per thousand gallons for the quantity of water supplied during each month. The first payment to be made on the 1st day of _____, 190 ____.

3. If the rent of the meter or charge for meter are not paid to the Municipal Council within fifteen days from the due date, the right to the separate service shall be forfeited and the Municipal Council may discontinue the supply.

4. The regulations of chapter XII. attached to No. 19 of 1896, or of by-laws which take their place, shall be taken as part of this agreement, and shall be binding on the parties thereto.

5. The agreement may be determined by either party giving to the other party seven days notice of his intention to determine the same. In the event of its being so determined, neither the owner nor the occupier of the premises shall be entitled to the use of the separate service until a fresh agreement shall have been made.
