MUNICIPAL COUNCIL NOTICES.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on Saturday, June 17, 1905, at 8.30 o'clock a.m., in accordance with Notice dated June 12, 1905.

Present:—Hon. Mr. H. Wace, C.M.G., Chairman; J. H. Sproule, Esq.; E. Beven, Esq.; C. Vanderwall, Esq.; R. W. Jonklaas, Esq.; L. Creasy, Esq.; P. T. Habeeboo Lebbe, Esq.

- 1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on May 20, 1905, were read, confirmed, and signed by the Chairman.
- 2. The following documents were submitted:—Statements of Receipts and Expenditure from close of 1904 to May 31, 1905, on account of the Municipal Fund, comprising the (No. 1) General Revenue, (No. 2) Consolidated Rate (Police and Lighting), and (No. 3) Water-rate Accounts; Progress Report of Works done brought up to the same date; Health Officer's Report for, and Statement of Cases instituted by the several Inpectors during, the month of May, 1905.

Resolved—That the several statements, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 90 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887, and the Health Officer's report, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the Government Gazette.

- The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries inspected during May, 1905.
 - 4. The Auditor's report for May, 1905, was laid on the table after previous circulation.
- 5. In accordance with notice Mr. R.W. Jonklass asked—Whether a petition was received from Wellayen and others, coolies in the Night Soil Department, making certain specific charges against the overseer, and to move for papers.

Reply:—A petition was received purporting to be signed by Vellayan, who is not known and cannot at present be traced. Inquiry will be made.

Papers connected with a previous inquiry upon a similar petition were laid on the table.

6. In accordance with notice Mr. C. Vanderwall moved—That the rent payable by Mr. J. C. Ebert of Colombo, in respect of an encroachment on the road to Halloluwa, be reduced to one rupee per annum.

Mr. Beven seconded the motion.

On a division being called, the Chairman declared the motion to be lost, there being only two in favou and five against.

It was subsequently agreed to, on suggestion of the Chairman in Council, by Members present that Mr. Ebert be offered a reduction of 50 cents a month.

- The following correspondence was submitted and read:—
- (a) Memorandum dated May 20, from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding copy of reply forwarded to Mr. C. D. M. Wickramatunga respecting his dismissal.
- (b) Endorsement of May 24, from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding petition from Mr. J. H. Lodewyke, objecting to the construction of a building on the site selected for use of the Young Women's Christian Association, with the Chairman's report thereon.
- (c) Endorsement No. 1 of April 4 and letter No. 24 of May 26, from the Colonial Secretary, respecting the improvement of the railway station.

The Chairman stated that he met the General Manager at the station, who proposed to effect the following improvements and alterations with the approval of Government, viz. :

- (1) Remove ticket office for 1st and 2nd class passengers to office now occupied by Station Master.
- (2) Enlarge gentlemen's waiting-room by removal of urinal and latrine.

(3) Provide latrine for gentlemen elsewhere.

(4) Provide new booking office and entrance to platform for 3rd class passengers.

(5) Revert to former arrangement by which trains were brought up to the buffer-stops, thereby securing protection of passengers from rain and sun.

(6) Additional seats have been already ordered.

It was proposed by Mr. Sproule and seconded by Mr. Vanderwall, and it was unanimously agreed to that the General Manager be thanked for the arrangements he proposed to make at the Kandy station to meet the convenience and comfort of the passengers.

- Considered the following recommendations by Standing Committees:-
- (a) By Committee on Law and General Subjects-That five badges similar to the amended design be supplied and the cost entered in the Supplemental Budget.

Proposed by Mr. Beven, and seconded by Mr. Vanderwall, that the recommendation be adopted.

(b) By Committee on Finance and Assessment—That the arrangement suggested by the Chairman, on application of the Secretary for temporary assistance, be adopted, to take effect from June 1.

Proposed by Mr. Beven, and seconded by Mr. Sproule, that the recommendation be adopted, it being understood that no new office be created thereby.

The motion on being put to the Meeting was carried. Mr. Jonklaas dissenting.

(c) By Committee on Municipal Works-That the following application for house service pipes be allowed on the usual conditions, No. 327, Trincomalee street....

Proposed by Mr. Vanderwall, and seconded by Mr. Habeeboo Lebbe, that the application for house

service pipes be granted on the usual conditions, namely :-

- (1) That a meter be fixed on the service pipes and a charge made for its use and for water con sumed in excess of allowance in accordance with the by-laws.
- (2) That a half-inch pipe be allowed and the bib tap be placed at a height of not more than two feet above the level of the ground.

The motion was carried.

- 9. Report by Standing Committee on Finance and Assessment on objections to assessment Resolved—That the recommendations be adopted.
- This being the last occasion on which Mr. Creasy would be present at the Municipal Council, it was proposed by Mr. Sproule, seconded by Mr. Beven, and supported by Mr. Vanderwall, that a vote of thanks be recorded in the Minutes expressive of the regret of the Council that Mr. Creasy is retiring from the Council, and that thanks of this Council be conveyed to Mr. Creasy for his useful services and active co-operation in measures having for their object the welfare of this city and of the taxpayers while he has been a Member of this Council.

The motion on being put was carried nem. con.

Health Officer's Report for May, 1905.

Scavenging.—The scavenging of the town was satisfactorily carried out during the month.

Drainage.—The deep drains, with the exception of those in Colombo street, remain in much the same condition as they have done for years. They have been kept clean and regularly flushed. The surface drains, generally well kept; those in the upper part of Railway approach road and Slaughter-house road are still in a filthy condition, and will be until they are properly cemented.

Water supply.—Good. Vide my analysis of May 3. But the water used by the people, both at Peradeniya and Katugastota, I look upon as unfit for domestic purposes, vide my reports of April 15 and 18. The people of these villages mostly use river water because the well is too far away or the spring supply insufficient. I have recommended and do recommend that further wells may be given to these villages.

Alleys.—Kept in as sanitary state as possible.

Laundries.—Generally well kept.

Dairies.—All fairly well kept.

Bakeries,-Well kept.

Market.-Well kept. All food stuffs exposed for sale were found good.

Cattle passed this month.—Cattle, 518; buffaloes, 106; sheep, 131; goats, 265. There has been a great improvement in the sanitation and appearance of the market lately. The stall-holders have been persuaded to build better constructed stalls and so do away with the old gunny bag and bamboo, which most of them were

Slaughter-house and exposing shed .- Well kept.

Cooly lines .- All fairly well kept. Boutiques.—All fairly well kept. Night soil depot.—Well kept.

Latrines.—Generally well kept. I would draw your attention to the insufficient accommodation of the latrines at the back of the Police Court; these places have to relieve not only the many people who have to

attend the court, but all the inhabitants of the upper end of Colombo street.

General health.—Good. A good many cases of chickenpox were reported during the month, chiefly at the Police Barracks, and three cases of enteric fever, two reported from the hospital (May 9) and the third at Getembe (May 20). This case was treated at home, vide my Infectious Disease Book. The houses were thoroughly disinfected and every precaution taken.

MUNICIPALITY OF COLOMBO.

N terms of section 8 of Ordinance No. 5 of 1899, I hereby give notice that the licenses for the sale of opium by retail within the limits of the Municipality of Colombo for the year commencing January 1, 1906, will be four in number. The said licenses will be offered for sale by tender, and the sale will be subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

2. Sealed tenders addressed to the Chairman, Municipal Council, Colombo, will be received at the Colombo Kachcheri up to 12 noon on September 27, 1905, for purchase of all or any of the following licenses for the sale of opium by retail within the Colombo Municipality, viz., at (1) Sea street, (2) Grandpass, (3) Maradana, 2nd Division, (4) Malay street, for the year 1906, on the conditions hereinafter mentioned, and subject to the provisions of the Opium Ordinances of 1899, 1903, 1904, and 1905.

Forms of tender may be obtained at the Municipal Office, Colombo.

No tender will be considered unless the tenderer is present in person, or by his agent duly authorized in writing, at the Colombo Kachcheri at 12 noon on September 27, 1905, and is prepared to deposit forthwith one-third of the amount of his tender.

5. In the event of two or more tenders being for an equal amount the Chairman shall have the option of forthwith offering the license for sale by public auction—the bidding to be restricted to the tenderers in question—or of calling for fresh tenders, or otherwise disposing of the license in accordance with the provisions of the Opium Ordinances, Nos. 5 of 1899 and 14 of 1903.

Every tender must contain the full name and address of the person tendering. The Chairman does not bind himself to accept the highest or any tender.

The person whose tender or bid is accepted will become the purchaser of the license, and shall forthwith make payment of one-third of the amount of his tender or bid and comply with the conditions hereinafter mentioned.

Conditions subject to which Retail Licenses are issued.

- The purchaser of a license to sell opium by retail shall, immediately on his being declared by the proper authority to be the purchaser, pay in cash one-third of his bid or tender, which sum shall be held by the proper authority as security, but cannot be used for payment of any of the instalments of the amount of the bid or tender, except those for the last four months. He shall pay the amount of the bid or tender in twelve equal monthly instalments on the last day of every month during the currency of his rent, the first instalment to be paid on January 31, 1906, and shall pay interest at 9 per cent. per annum for every day for which an instalment is in arrear. The security money may be, at the request of the purchaser, placed in fixed deposit at any bank to be selected by him, and shall be at the risk of the purchaser. Should any instalment not be paid on the due date the proper authority may resell the license, or so much of the term thereof as may be unexpired, at the risk of the purchaser.
- The store or premises hereby licensed must be fully described in the body of this license, which shall apply to the premises so described and nothing more.

The premises hereby licensed shall not have internal communication with any other buildings or 3. premises.

The premises hereby licensed shall be kept clean and in good sanitary condition.

It shall be the duty of the person in charge of the premises hereby licensed to open them for inspection on the demand of any person appointed an Inspector by the proper authority in writing, or of any police officer not below the rank of Inspector. The person in charge shall also be bound to produce all books, documents, or accounts with reference to the receipt or disposal of opium which he has in his possession, and to weigh, if specially called on to do so, in the presence of the Inspector or Police Officer, all opium in stock or on the premises at the time of the inspection; he shall also explain to the best of his ability any discrepancy that may be found to exist between the quantity of opium in stock and the quantity which, according to the books, ought to be in stock at the time of inspection.

No opium shall be consumed on the premises hereby licensed.

No opium kept on the premises hereby licensed shall be adulterated or deteriorated in any way.

No disorderly conduct shall be permitted on the premises hereby licensed.

9. No opium shall be delivered on the premises hereby licensed to any person who is under the influence of liquor or opium, or who is apparently under the age of fifteen years.

10. No opium shall be delivered on, or from, or received into, the premises hereby licensed between the

hours of eight at night and six in the morning.

There shall be kept on the premises hereby licensed a bound Stock Book with numbered pages. A copy of such book for the premises hereby licensed will be delivered free by the proper authority to the licensee when he takes out his license. If a new book is required, it must be purchased by the licensee from the proper authority, to whom the previous book must be delivered.

12. It shall be the duty of the licensee to see that all receipts and disposals of opium are regularly entered in the Stock Book immediately the transaction takes place, all the columns in the book being correctly

filled in and the quantity in stock at the beginning and end of the day being clearly shown.

13. It shall also be the duty of licensee to see that on or before the second of each month there is transmitted to the Inspector-General of Police a correct copy of the Stock Book and a correct copy of the book required to be kept under condition No. 20.

14. It shall be the duty of the Inspector-General of Police to issue to the licensee a receipt for such correct copies when they have been received. In the event of the licensee not receiving such receipt within a week of his posting the correct copies, it shall be his duty to communicate with the Inspector-General of Police and ascertain whether such correct copies have been received, and if they have miscarried to supply duplicates.

- 15. It shall be the duty of the licensee, before he receives his license, to submit to the proper authority a list giving the names of the persons whom he proposes to employ on the premises hereby licensed. Such statement shall contain the full name and description of each employé, and specify the nature of the work which he is to perform. All such persons must be over the age of twenty-one years, and the proper authority must be satisfied that they are of good character. No person whose name has not been endorsed on this license by the proper authority shall be employed by the licensee to take charge of, receive, or sell opium on his account, and the licensee shall not permit any one whose name is not so endorsed to perform any of the above duties.
- The licensee may from time to time apply to the proper authority to make such alterations as seem desirable in the list of persons employed; such alterations shall be endorsed on this license, and the licensee on receiving a notice from the proper authority to remove any person employed on the premises hereby licensed shall within one week of his receiving such notice produce this license to the proper authority so that the name of such employé may be erased from this license. Such person shall then be disqualified for employment in the premises hereby licensed.
- 17. It shall be the duty of the licensee to see that a board having the number of this license, the name of the licensee, and the words "Licensed to Sell Opium by Retail," legibly painted upon it, is kept affixed to some conspicuous part of the premises hereby licensed.
- 18. No business or occupation except the sale of opium or cigars shall be carried on in the premises hereby licensed.

19. No opium shall be sold except for cash paid on the spot.

- It shall be the duty of the licensee to make an entry in a book to be kept for that purpose, giving the full name and address of the purchaser and giving the quantity sold to him, and the date of sale, whenever opium exceeding 4 drams in weight is sold at any one time.
- 21. The licensee shall keep on the premises hereby licensed and have available for use at all times a true set of scales and the following standard weights :-

Avoirdupois: $\frac{1}{4}$ oz., $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., 1 oz., 2 oz., 4 oz., 8 oz., 1 tb., 2 tb., 4 tb., 7 tb.

22. The licensee shall observe the rules hereinafter mentioned for keeping his books.

MUNICIPALITY OF KANDY.

Minutes of Proceedings of a Meeting of the Municipal Council of Kandy held in the Town Hall, Kandy, on Saturday, July 15, 1905, at 8.30 o'clock a.m., in accordance with Notice dated July 11, 1905.

Present:—Hon. Mr. H. Wace, C.M.G., Chairman; J. H. Sproule, Esq.; E. Beven, Esq.; W. D. Gibbon, Esq.; C. Vanderwall, Esq.; R. W. Jonklaas, Esq.; P. T. Habeeboo Lebbe, Esq.; Dr. G. P. Schokman.

- 1. The Minutes of Proceedings of the Meeting held on June 17, were read, confirmed, and signed by the Chairman.
- 2. The following documents were submitted:—Statements of Receipts and Expenditure from close of 1904 to June 30, 1905, on account of the Municipal Fund, comprising the (No. 1) General Revenue, (No. 2) Consolidated Rate (Police and Lighting), and (No. 3) Water-rate Accounts; Progress Report of Works done brought up to the same date; Health Officer's Report for, and Statement of Cases instituted by the several Inspectors during, the month of June, 1905.

Resolved—That the several statements, together with the Minutes of Proceedings of this Meeting, as required by section 90 of the Municipal Councils' Ordinance, No. 7 of 1887, and the Health Officer's report, be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary for publication in the *Government Gazette*.

With reference to the Health Officer's remarks on scavenging, it was ordered that the overseer's attention be directed to the proviso requiring him to furnish each cart with a bell, and that it be enforced.

- 3. The following papers were laid on the table:—Reports by the several Inspectors on laundries inspected during June.
 - 4. Auditor's report for June, dated July 13, with explanatory notes.
 - 5. The following correspondence was brought forward and read:-
- (a) Memorandum dated June 20, from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding copy of reply to Mr. Lodewyke's petition complaining of the construction of the building for the Young Women's Christian Association in proximity to his buildings, and informing him that His Excellency declines to accede to his request.
- (b) Memorandum dated July 5, from the Colonial Secretary, forwarding copy of letter to the Treasurer respecting the mode of repayment of the loan obtained for improvement of road round the lake to be in terms of bond.
- (c) Letter dated June 21, from Mr. G. Greene, thanking Council for copy of resolution sent him re Railway improvements.
 - (d) Letter from Mr. L. Creasy, thanking the Council for the vote of thanks accorded him.
 - (e) Letter from Mr. L. Creasy, dated June 20, resigning his office as a Member of the Municipal Council.
- 6. With reference to the motion of which notice had been given by Mr. Vanderwall, it was postponed on his application by consent of the Council. \bullet
- 7. The Chairman brought forward the following recommendation by the Standing Committee on "Municipal Works" with reference to a petition by residents respecting claims made by the Municipal Council for use of meters and for water used in excess of allowance:—"That the petitioners be informed that the Council is unable to comply with their request, the demand for payment being made in conformity with the by-laws of January, 1904."
- 8. Recommendation by Standing Committee on "Municipal Works," "that the building standing on the Council's premises Nos. 271 and 272, Trincomalee street, be demolished, and the land utilized for a permanent vegetable market."

Proposed by Mr Vanderwall, and seconded by Mr. Beven, that the recommendation be adopted.—Carried nem con.

9. Recommendation by Standing Committee on "Law and General Subjects," "that five raincoats be provided for use of the Inspectors, cost not exceeding Rs. 18 each."

Proposed by Mr. Beven, and seconded by Mr. Vanderwall, that the recommendation be adopted. On being put to the Meeting this was carried. Dr. Schokman dissenting.

10. Letter from the Health Officer respecting the very insanitary state of cesspit on premises No. 121. Colombo street, and recommending that the cesspit be closed and a dry-earth closet substituted.

Proposed by Mr. Sproule, and seconded by Mr. Habeeboo Lebbe—That special authority be granted to the Chairman in accordance with section 209 of Ordinance No. 7 of 1887, as amended by section 33 of Ordinance No. 1 of 1896, to require the owner of the said premises to empty, disinfect, and close the cesspit on the said premises and to substitute a dry-earth closet therefor.

China Sea-Gaspar Strait.-Pare Joie Reef-Its approximate position.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 717 of 1905) that the Captain of the American'ss. Mississippi reports that on May10 his vessel passed a coral reef awash, in the northern approach to Gaspar strait, in approximately lat. 2° 19′ S., long. 107° 08′ E.

The position of this reported danger is about 3 miles eastward of the position assigned to the rock on which the ship Pare Joie struck in 1870, and remained 24 hours in a position from which Gasper island bore S. ½ E., distant 5 miles. The report from that vessel also stated that she was 4½ miles eastward of the rock marked E.D., situated on the chart in lat. 2° 19½′ S., long. 107° 3′ E., or about 3 miles eastward from that given by the bearing, and in that now reported by the Mississippi.

The first position of the Pare Joie and the E.D. position were unsuccessfully searched for by H.N.M. surveying vessel Hydrograaf in 1876.

It is quite possible that the three positions which lie in the same latitude, and nearly 3 miles apart from each other, may be one and the same shoal, and near the position assigned to it by the Mississippi, and where no soundings have yet been taken. Pare Joie reef has therefore been transferred on the chart to the position given by the Mississippi and the reef E.D. expunged.

Japan—Nakai—Hiroshima wan—Ono Seto—Submarine Telegraph Cables.

The British Admiralty has given notice (No. 729 of 1905) that two submarine telegraph cables have been laid across Ono Seto, Hiroshima wan, from Itsuku shima to the main land. The northernmost leaves the shore of Itsuku shima at a point situated at a distance of $3\frac{1}{2}$ cables S. 17° E. from Kame se light, and is laid in a north-westerly direction to a point on the shore of the mainland, situated at a distance of $4\frac{3}{4}$ cables N. 77° W. from Kame se light. The southernmost cable is laid in a parallel line at a distance of a quarter of a cable from the northernmost cable.
